

 CMS on the CFC conflict of interest exception request. It also highlights what we and they
 understand; the exception criteria is not a perfect fit for Vermont's situation, as there is more
 than one available case management agency.
- Re: Follow up question on CFC HHA/AAAs: this email shows CMS confirmation that our follow up response was received.
- Conflict Free Case Management_DA_DMH(03): this document was sent to CMS on 9/22/17
 and seeks the conflict free case management exception for mental health programs and
 services provided through Designated Agencies. This brief is able to show clearly that there is
 only one willing and qualified case manager for Mental Health HCBS services. No response has
 been received to this brief.

Finally, CMS indicated to the State of Vermont in conversations that any exception to the conflict free case management requirements described in federal regulations must be enacted through an amendment to our 1115 waiver. We have had a couple of meetings so far and I wanted you to have some of the documents that we have shared. The first document is one I brought to the meeting on 12/1/17. This is an outline of the essential components that would need to be part of the new payment and service delivery model. The second is the proposal that the providers brought to that meeting which includes future reimbursement model and also a consideration for the reconciliation process for FY18. The current DDS System of Care Plan included a new reconciliation process for FY18. I am attaching the page from the SOCP that explains how agencies are supposed to suspend billing for services not delivered. The highlighted sections are new language added to the new SOCP which went into effect 10.1.17 There is another separate document that outlines the reconciliation process. I am sure you will have questions about all this which we can discuss when we meet.

I'm bringing the discussion regarding employment back "in house" until we come to an agreement.

I wasn't part of the earlier discussions but I agree that we want to use data that is vetted and used at the national level and reported by other states. That's why we (DDSD) uses the DOL data to demonstrate employment rate in VT. It is the most accurate, represents all people working and has been collected and reported nationally for years. It is our agreed upon standard measure of employment for DD services that we also use in our Scorecard and it matches other all other publications where employment rate is reported.

I will add that just because data is available through NCI does not make it the best source for a particular data set. The NCI employment data that was suggested here is not consistently reported from agency to agency or from state to state and it is only a subset of those served. The data that is collected from this section of the

NCI survey is one of the most unreliable of all the data collected in the survey.





A Comprehensive Quality Strategy (CQS) is a CMS required document for all states implementing Managed Care in its Medicaid Program. The Vermont CQS Outline serves as a blueprint or road map for Vermont and its public Managed Care Organization in assessing the quality of care that beneficiaries receive, as well as for setting forth measurable goals and targets for improvement.

Comprehensive Quality Strategy (9/15/15)

Comprehensive Quality Strategy - with Edits (2/9/16)

Driver Diagram - The Global Commitment to Health (GC) driver diagram is a tool used to display the components of Vermont's improvement efforts in its Medicaid Program (via the waiver), as well as, to communicate the waiver's theory of change. The driver diagram displays the goals of the waiver, identifies their drivers, shows how the drivers are connected, and ultimately provides the basis for how Vermont will measure its performance relative to the goals.

HCBS Systemic Assessments - These documents assess the existing Vermont regulations and standards related to HCBS delivery to determine if they meet the federal HCBS final rule requirements. Items are scored as alignment, partial alignment, silent, or non-compliant. All items that do not receive a score of alignment are subject to remediation or corrective action plans and included on the associated Work Plan.

HCBS Work Plans - These documents expand upon the System Assessments by identifying subsequent action steps for the Vermont regulations and standards that did not receive a score of alignment. The action step must resolve the identified issue and bring the Vermont regulation and/or standard into alignment with the federal HCBS final rule.

HCBS Surveys: Consumer Validation and Site Specific Setting Assessment - Surveys available at this link were used by the state of Vermont to assess specific settings in which home and community-based services (HCBS) are provided to determine compliance with the new HCBS setting rules and to validate the provier self-assessment results. Medicaid enrollees increasingly are receiving long-term services and supports (LTSS) in the home and community. In 2016, for the fourth consecutive year, more than half of Medicaid spending for LTSS was for home- and community-based services (HCBS) rather than institutional care (Eiken et al. 2018). This shift is the result of a variety of factors, including efforts by federal and state policymakers to rebalance Medicaid LTSS spending towards HCBS in order to curb spending growth and meet beneficiary preferences to live in the community. Medicaid spending on HCBS users remains disproportionately high relative to their share of enrollment. In 2013, the approximately 4 percent of Medicaid enrollees who used HCBS accounted for 23.9 percent of Medicaid fee-for-service (FFS) spending on all services (\$97.8 billion of \$409.3 billion) (MACPAC 2017).1

HCBS users have diverse needs, and thus vary in the types of HCBS they use. To date, however, analyses of service use and spending associated with HCBS users have not taken a detailed look at the types of HCBS used and the individual characteristics of users. This fact sheet presents the results of an analysis that describes, in greater detail than has been done before, the characteristics and service use of Medicaid enrollees who used HCBS in 44 states in 2012, and analyzes Medicaid spending for these HCBS users. We focused particularly on high-cost users, defined as the 3 percent of HCBS users with the highest spending on HCBS in each state. These high-cost users accounted for nearly one-third of Medicaid spending on HCBS in our analysis (\$17.8 of \$58.1 billion).

Most HCBS users, and particularly those who are high-cost users, were age 19 to 64 and qualified for Medicaid-covered HCBS due to a disability. Intellectual disorders and related conditions (such as Down syndrome) as well as neurological disorders (such as cerebral palsy and epilepsy) were the most common diagnoses reported on claims data for high-cost users. This population has high care needs; 57.1 percent of Medicaid spending for high-cost users was for around-the-clock care. Details on the methodology used in this analysis can be found in Appendix A. The complete results are available in the MACPAC-commissioned report by Mathematica Policy Research, HCBS claims analysis chartbook: Final report (Peebles et al. 2017)

To date, much of the focus has been on incorporating and implementing the new HCBS regulations related to the setting requirement and person centered approaches for service planning. Both DAIL and DMH have been active members of the implementation team. Emma H is the only cross-over with PAC and the MCE Quality Committee. Bill C is the DVHA representative to this group.



and importance of disability-specific congregate, farmstead, and lifesharing communities in the Medicaid program. As written,

the guidance discriminates against these communities, as well as against other rural-based settings which offer individuals with

By painting all congregate and farmstead communities with a broad brush, CMS threatens to remove a critical choice from individuals

the 2014 final rule to protect patient choice and dignity, but urge CMS to revise its subsequent guidance to clarify that congregate

and farmstead communities based on the lifesharing model are not subject to the heightened scrutiny standard. We understand that

these communities would welcome third party certification (such as through the Center for Quality and Leadership) as an alternative to the current broad-brush policy."



Bard will send two documents: a power point on the level setting for DAIL and a synopsis of the language in the agreement. If you agree that this approach makes sense, we can proceed from

there.

Copying Melissa and Mary Kate as DMH may have its own level setting for LTSS and Mary Kate can speak to the internal work we've already done around this.

I've reviewed the DAIL/DVHA IGA, AHS/DVHA IGA, and Medicaid Compliance Plan and have had discussions with DVHA (e.g., Bill Clark, Lori Collins, etc.) regarding the responsibility for program integrity and utilization reviews for the CFC program and in particular the consumer and surrogate-directed services option. I'd like to know DAIL's position regarding whether it is responsible, for the CFC consumer and surrogate-directed services option, for ensuring compliance with 42 CFR part 456, (Utilization Control), 42 CFR, part 455 (Program Integrity), and 42 CFR 438, subpart H (Additional Program Integrity Safeguards) or whether these responsibilities reside with DVHA.

If the answer is that DAIL is responsible, I'd like to know how DAIL addresses the program integrity requirements for the CFC consumer and surrogate-directed services option (I've already had discussions w/Megan re: utilization). Specifically, has DAIL established a program/organization that is responsible for conducting reviews, audits and investigations related to fraud and abuse for the consumer and surrogate-directed services option (please provide supporting documentation if such a program/organization exists)? 





You have the major communications sent to CMS. I've attached two emails and another document that could be helpful:

- Re: Vermont Choices for Care Program Summary and Proposed Panning to Strengthen Conflict of Interest Protections: this email shows multiple attempts to gain response from CMS on the CFC conflict of interest exception request. It also highlights what we and they understand; the exception criteria is not a perfect fit for Vermont's situation, as there is more than one available case management agency.
- Re: Follow up question on CFC HHA/AAAs: this email shows CMS confirmation that our follow up response was received.
- Conflict Free Case Management DA DMH(03): this document was sent to CMS on 9/22/17 and seeks the conflict free case management exception for mental health programs and services provided through Designated Agencies. This brief is able to show clearly that there is only one willing and qualified case manager for Mental Health HCBS services. No response has been received to this brief.

Finally, CMS indicated to the State of Vermont in conversations that any exception to the conflict free case management requirements described in federal regulations must be enacted through an amendment to our 1115 waiver. At the time, we decided the next opportunity to ask for the exception would be through the SUD amendment process, however, I do not believe that loose end was tied off prior to the SUD amendment approval.







And here was my answer. "Hi Linda. I believe we have talked about this topic in one of our past meetings. We do not currently have a process in which we consistently compare the SAMS plans to the MMIS claims at the individual level, like Hugh has been doing for the audit. We monitor globally through our business office who compares the SAMS "planned" amounts to the Medicaid payments to date and generates monthly report. I've attached a copy of the most recent one, which you can see is a "working document". This document is shared with a management group consisting of DAIL, Division of Rate Setting, Division of Licensing and Protection and Adult Services monthly and discusses any abnormalities that may be happening. We review SAMS/MMIS claims samples as requested for specific reasons, such as by request of DVHA program integrity. For example, we did this a couple of months ago to evaluate the overlapping nursing facility claims. The results of that review were given to DVHA who instructed DXC to recoup a list of identified claims. Bard or Bill do you have anything to add?"







4. State Long Term Care Ombudsman: Many of you will remember that each year the State Long Term Care Ombudsman submits an annual report to the legislature and as part of that report, is required to submit an assessment of the programs ability to operate free from conflict of interest as an appendix to that report. Over the past year, the Vermont Ombudsman Project and DAIL have been working collaboratively to implement new Federal Regulations for ombudsman programs, including conflict of interest. Per state statute, the DAIL Commissioner is required to establish a committee who represent the interests of individuals receiving long-term care for the purpose of ensuring that the Ombudsman program is free from conflicts of interests. Congratulations, DAIL Advisory Board, that committee is YOU! Last year, a small subcommittee of the Advisory Board worked with the State Ombudsman to review conflict of interest in detail, particularly in light of the new Federal Regulations and the need to revise the Ombudsman program policies to come into compliance. At that time, because the work was still on-going related to implementing the regulations and revising the policies, the board requested that a similar subcommittee be formed this year to last year's be convened to work with the State Long Term Care Ombudsman again and then report back to the full Advisory Board. So, State Long Term Care Ombudsman Sean Londergan will be talking a bit more about the program, this charge and requesting volunteers to be part of the subcommittee. Angela Smith-Dieng has been the DAIL lead working with the Ombudsman Program most recently so she will be joining as a resource. So, please be thinking about your interest and ability to serve on this subcommittee.

Attached is what we have so far as our draft State Plan on Aging for 2019-2022. A first draft is due to Rhonda at ACL on March 1st (same day as NAPIS variance explanations!). She has said it doesn't have to be perfect – just send what we've got so far so they can get a sense of where we're at and if we're including all the required components. I imagine there will be a few drafts back and forth with ACL. Rhonda also went through the ACL SPA instructions with me to make sure I was including key components AND she reiterated that we should try to make it not too long, and keep it manageable and measurable.

I am most interested in your feedback on pages 5-19, the narrative context and then the goals/objectives/strategies section. The goals section has been through multiple reviews by the SUA team, the AAA directors, and others since December and continues to be a work in progress. The narrative has only been reviewed so far by the SUA team. As a reminder, whatever we put in the goals section we are then accountable to report progress on to ACL, so if there are things we want to mention but don't necessarily want to have a specific objective about, let's see if we can weave them into the narrative rather than the goals. For example, I'm realizing there isn't really anything in there right now about work around CFC or nursing homes; maybe doesn't need to be in specific goals but perhaps in the narrative.

Bard, note that I am also hoping for your help, along with Jordan's, for the IFF section on page 22. I'm not sure how much we'll be able to do in this initial draft or what might need to wait for our usual IFF timeline in March...?

If you're able to send feedback in the next week (by 2/20) that would be ideal. If that's not possible, we can aim for later next week.

Please find attached the **System of Care Plan** that was developed by the State Interagency Team (SIT). **Feel free to forward to others. The plan can also be found on the IFS website** at: http://ifs.vermont.gov/docs/sit

This report is a statutory requirement of Act 264 – the law passed in 1988 and was then expanded in 2005 with an Interagency Agreement between the Agency of Education (AOE) and the Agency of Human Services (AHS). Act 264 requires that SIT submit an annual report to the commissioners of developmental and mental health services, social and rehabilitation services and education on the status of programs for children and adolescents with a severe emotional disturbance which shall include a system of care plan. The system of care plan shall identify the characteristics and number of children and adolescents with a severe emotional disturbance in need of services, describe the educational, residential, mental health or other services needed, describe the programs and resources currently available, recommend a plan to meet the needs of such children and adolescents, and recommend priorities for the continuation or development of programs and resources. Despite the statutory mandate, it is unclear when the last report was written (it's been over a decade at least).

This report brings together what SIT members have consistently heard expressed in communities, what its members know regarding best practice with families, and what the data are telling us about resources, gaps, and issues in the system that the most vulnerable families face every day as they try to navigate our service system. SIT also wanted to use this report to highlight the interdisciplinary work occurring at AHS and AOE.

The following recommendations from SIT are detailed in this report.

- 1. Support statewide integration of services through reinvigorating and resourcing Act 264 statutory mandates.
- 2. Focus on the number of children and youth in residential placements. A "Turn the Curve Initiative" began in June 2015 to look at increasing trend of not only more children and youth being placed in residential settings, but also the increased occurrence of very young children (4 and 5 years old) being placed in residential facilities. The goal of the Turn the Curve work is to: Increase the number of youth who are in family settings and increase family engagement for youth who are placed in residential care towards improving caregiver readiness.
- 3. Support payment reform efforts that move the System of Care away from fee-for-service and toward accountability focused on performance outcomes.
- 4. Support funding for family and youth partnership to be a shared responsibility of all AHS departments.

5. Increase collaboration with early childhood service providers and community supports due to trend of high rate of young children being placed into DCF custody and the fact that education begins for children in Vermont at age three.

In 2011, the New York State Office for People With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) engaged stakeholders in the process of identifying the elements necessary to support a systemic change from fee for service to a managed care service delivery system. Such a change would allow for better coordination of care and provision of supports to the people that OPWDD serves. One area of focus for stakeholders was the review and identification of a needs assessment instrument that would best align with a person-centered service delivery system.

...

After extensive research and stakeholder engagement effort, OPWDD chose the interRAI Intellectual Disability (ID) assessment instrument. This instrument was selected for two main reasons. First, the instrument met all of the criteria identified by stakeholders that were deemed relevant to the assessment of a person's needs. Secondly, the instrument met the necessary rigor in the personcentered administration process.

•••

The selection of the interRAI ID instrument and subsequent development of the CAS aligns with the use of interRAI assessment instruments by other New York State agencies (the Department of Health and the Office of Mental Health) providing supports for people in need of care for more than 120 days, which is also defined as people in need of long-term services and supports (LTSS). Since all interRAI assessment instruments contain a common core data set, the use of the interRAI assessments across service systems allowed New York State to adopt a core standardized assessment for all people in need of LTSS. The use of a core standardized assessment will allow New York State, for the first time, to have the ability to evaluate and compare the needs of people receiving LTSS across different service systems (e.g., DOH, OPWDD, OMH). This will help to break down the silos between systems providing LTSS in New York State. The development of a core standardized assessment for people with LTSS needs was also a requirement for states utilizing Federal Balancing Incentive Program (BIP) funding for Medicaid redesign allocated under the Affordable Care Act.s



AHCA Vote Could Come Next Week

House Republicans may attempt a floor vote on the American Health Care Act (AHCA) as early as next week, after Paul Ryan abruptly pulled the bill before it could be voted on last month due to a lack of support. The revived push for a floor vote was spurred by the approval by the 30-plus members of the conservative House Freedom Caucus of amendments to the legislation that would allow states the option to waive Essential Health Benefits (EHBs) requirements for insurers in their exchanges. The amendments, developed by members of the Freedom Caucus in collaboration with Representative Tom McArthur (R-NJ), a co-chair of the moderate Tuesday Group. The amendments would permit states to seek waivers of the Affordable Care Act (ACA)-mandated EHBs and the ACA's limits on agebanding of premiums for older insureds. The Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) would be required to approve such a waiver within 60 days if the state would need only asserted that the waiver would reduce average premiums, increase enrollment, stabilize the market for health insurance coverage, stabilize premiums for individuals with pre-existing conditions, or increase the choice of health plans. States that requested these waivers would be required to put in place protections to minimize cost increases for those with pre-existing conditions, such as high risk pools. House Whip counts indicated on April 27 that there were at least 15 votes—but as many as 35—opposed to passage. However, even with House passage, the consensus of Hill pundits is that the Senate is highly unlikely to pass the bill in its current form.

CCD Letter to Congress Opposes Amended AHCA

The Consortium for Citizens with Disabilities (CCD) sent a letter to Congress expressing its strong opposition to the amended American Health Care Act (AHCA).

According to CCD, the "amended American Health Care Act retains the original bill's proposals to dramatically cut Medicaid services that are vital to people with disabilities and seniors through per capita caps." The new amendments, the coalition says, makes "the amended AHCA even more harmful to people with disabilities."

The new amendments, the letter indicates, "would allow states to easily obtain waivers that would allow them to charge higher premiums to people with pre-existing conditions, including people with disabilities," and "would allow states to seek waivers from the Affordable Care Act's requirement to provide essential health benefits, including crucial services for people with disabilities such as mental health and substance use disorder services, prescription drugs, rehabilitative and habilitative services and devices, preventative and wellness services and chronic disease management, and pediatric services." The letter also reiterates CCD's opposition to converting Medicaid to per capita caps, calling the proposal "a cap that is totally unrelated to the actual costs of needed care for enrollees" that "will force states to cut services and eligibility that put the health and wellbeing of people with disabilities at significant risk."

Florida Among First States to Request Flexibilities from New HHS Leadership

Florida Governor Rick Scott's Administration sent a letter to Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Tom Price that may provide an early indication of the types of flexibilities states will seek in response to a letter Price and Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Administrator Seema Verma sent to governors in which the pair committed to "ushering in a new era for the federal and state Medicaid partnership where states have more freedom to design programs that meet the spectrum of diverse needs of their Medicaid population." If approved by HHS, the requested changes will be added to the state's current 1115 Managed Medical Assistance (MMA) waiver.

In the letter, Florida described its intention to submit requests to change its current 1115 MMA waiver, and asked CMS for other support. The requests include:

- A block grant of federal funds as a replacement for Florida's various supplemental payment programs along with annual savings the state achieves through Florida's current 1115 waiver.
- · Flexibility to modify retroactive eligibility.
- HHS's support to "strengthen the relationship between Medicaid beneficiaries and primary care providers" in order to reduce "uncoordinated and inappropriate ER visits."
- HHS's support to eliminate federal requirements that "lead to duplicative work at the state level and federal level for certified Medicaid managed care rates" and network adequacy requirements.
- HHS's support to "remove the federal administrative burdens placed on the state by the 'Access Rule."

House Passes Regulatory Accountability Act; Senate Version Introduced

The Regulatory Accountability Act has passed the House by a vote of 238-183. A Senate version has been introduced by Senators Rob Portman (R—OH), Orrin Hatch (R—UT), Heidi Heitkamp (D—ND) and Joe Manchin (D—WV).

The bill revises federal rulemaking procedures under the Administrative Procedure Act (APA) to require a federal agency to "make all preliminary and final factual determinations based on evidence" and to consider: (1) the legal authority under which a rule may be proposed; (2) the specific nature and significance of the problem the agency may address with a rule; (3) whether existing rules have created or contributed to the problem the agency may address with a rule and whether such rules may be amended or rescinded; (4) any reasonable alternatives for a new rule; and (5) the potential costs and benefits associated with potential alternative rules, including impacts on low-income populations.

Rulemaking notice requirements are revised to require agencies to:

- "publish in the Federal Register advance notice of proposed rulemaking involving a major or high-impact rule, a negative-impact-on-jobs-and-wages rule, or a rule that involves a novel legal or policy issue arising out of statutory mandates;
- consult with the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA) of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) before issuing a proposed rule and after the issuance of an advance notice of proposed rulemaking;
- provide interested persons an opportunity to participate in the rule making process;
- hold a hearing before the adoption of any high-impact rule;
- expand requirements for the adoption of a final rule, including requiring that the agency adopt a rule only on the basis of the best evidence and at the least cost; and
- grant any interested person the right to petition for the issuance, amendment, or repeal of a rule."

A "major rule" or "major guidance" is a rule or guidance that OIRA determines is likely to impose: (1) an annual cost on the economy of \$100 million or more, adjusted annually for inflation; (2) a major increase in costs or prices; (3) significant adverse effects on competition, employment, investment, productivity, innovation, or the ability of U.S. enterprises to compete with foreign-based enterprises; or (4) significant impacts on multiple sectors of the economy. The bill defines "high-impact rule" as a rule that OIRA determines is likely to have an annual cost on the economy of \$1 billion or more, adjusted annually for inflation; and "negative-impact-on-jobs-and-wages rule" as any rule likely to reduce employment or wages in certain economic sectors or industry areas by specified amounts over specified periods.

The bill specifies the minimum amount of information that must be included in an advance notice of a proposed rulemaking. After notice or advance notice of a proposed rulemaking, the agency making the rule "is prohibited from: (1) advocating for the submission of information to form part of the record of review, (2) appealing to the public to undertake advocacy, or (3) communicating for publicity or propaganda within the United States in a manner not authorized by Congress." The agency may request comments or information in an impartial manner.

The notice of final rulemaking that agencies must publish when they adopt a final major rule shall include a report, to be revised every five years, on the benefits and costs to regulated entities. If an agency determines in a revised report that the cost to regulated entities has exceeded the anticipated cost at the time the final rule was issued, the agency must submit to Congress an assessment of whether the rule is accomplishing its regulatory objective; and whether it has been rendered unnecessary considering changes in the subject area, other government regulations, and alternatives that might impose smaller burdens or achieve lower costs. Upon delivery of such an assessment about a rule exceeding the anticipated cost, the agency must reopen the public docket to receive additional comments, and consider modifications or alternatives that reduce costs and increase benefits to regulated entities or individuals.

The bill revises standards for the scope of judicial review of agency rulemaking to "prohibit a court from deferring to an agency's determination of the costs and benefits or other economic or risk assessment if the agency failed to conform to guidelines on such determinations and assessments established by OIRA." Courts would also be prohibited from deferring to determinations made in the adoption of an interim rule, or guidance.

Title II of the bill modifies the scope of judicial review of agency actions to authorize courts reviewing agency actions to decide de novo (without giving deference to the agency's interpretation) all relevant questions of law, including the interpretation of

constitutional and statutory provisions, and rules made by agencies. If the reviewing court "determines that a statutory or regulatory provision relevant to its decision contains a gap or ambiguity, the court shall not interpret or rely on that gap or ambiguity as an implicit delegation to the agency of legislative rulemaking authority, or a justification for interpreting agency authority expansively or for deferring to the agency's interpretation on the question of law."

Title IV prohibits a final agency rule from being published or taking effect until OIRA makes a determination as to whether the rule is a high-impact rule that may impose an annual cost on the economy of at least \$1 billion. Further, agencies must "postpone the effective date of a high-impact rule until the final disposition of all actions seeking judicial review of the rule."

Title V requires each federal agency to submit a monthly report to OIRA for each rule the agency expects to propose or finalize during the following 12 months. The reports must include summary of the nature of the rule, the objectives of and legal basis for issuance of the rule, the stage of the rulemaking as of the date of submission, and whether the rule is subject to periodic review as a rule with a significant economic impact. Each agency must also submit a monthly report for any rule expected to be finalized during the following 12 months for which the agency has issued a general notice of proposed rulemaking, which must include an approximate schedule for completing action on the rule; estimates of its cost, economic effects, and any imposition of unfunded mandates; and a list of influential scientific information disseminated by the agency relating to the rule, including any peer review plans for the information.

Title VI requires the general notice of proposed rulemaking by a federal agency to include the Internet address of a plain-language summary, not exceeding 100 words, of the proposed rule, which shall be posted on the regulations.gov website.

Legislation Would Expand Right to Community Integration

Senate Minority Leader Charles Schumer (D—NY) has reintroduced the Disability Integration Act (DIA). The legislation, modeled on the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the ADA Amendments Act, expresses in law an explicit civil right for people with disabilities to receive Long Term Supports and Services (LTSS) in the community. It reads: "No public entity or LTSS insurance provider shall deny an individual with an LTSS disability who is eligible for institutional placement, or otherwise discriminate against that individual in the provision of, community-based long-term services and supports that enable the individual to live in the community and lead an independent life."

Under the Act, discrimination by a public entity or LTSS insurance provider includes:

- "the imposition or application of eligibility criteria or another policy that prevents ...an individual with an LTSS disability, or any class of individuals with LTSS disabilities, from receiving a community-based long-term service or support;
- the imposition or application of a policy or other mechanism, such as a service or cost cap, that prevents...an individual with an LTSS disability, or any class of individuals with LTSS disabilities, from receiving a community-based long-term service or support;
- a failure to provide a specific community-based long-term service or support or a type of community-based long-term service or support needed for an individual with an LTSS disability, or any class of individuals with LTSS disabilities;
- the imposition or application of a policy, rule, regulation, or restriction that interferes with the opportunity for an individual with an LTSS disability, or any class of individuals with LTSS disabilities, to live in the community and lead an independent life, which may include a requirement that an individual with an LTSS disability receive a service or support (such as day services or employment services) in a congregate or disability-specific setting;
- the imposition or application of a waiting list or other mechanism that delays or restricts access of an individual with an LTSS disability to a community-based long-term service or support;
- a failure to establish an adequate rate or other payment structure that is necessary to ensure the availability of a workforce sufficient to support an individual with an LTSS disability in living in the community and leading an independent life;
- a failure to provide community-based services and supports, on an intermittent, short-term, or emergent basis, that assist an individual with an LTSS disability to live in the community and lead an independent life;
- the imposition or application of a policy, such as a requirement that an individual utilize informal support, that restricts, limits, or delays the ability of an individual with an LTSS disability to secure a community-based long-term service or support to live in the community or lead an independent life;
- a failure to implement a formal procedure and a mechanism to ensure that individuals with LTSS disabilities are offered the alternative of community-based long-term services and supports prior to institutionalization...
- a failure to ensure that each institutionalized individual with an LTSS disability is regularly notified of the alternative of community-based long-term services and supports...; and
- a failure to make a reasonable modification in a policy, practice, or procedure, when such modification is necessary to allow an individual with an LTSS disability to receive a community-based long-term service or support."

The bill also includes "a failure to ensure that there is sufficient availability of affordable, accessible, and integrated housing to allow an individual with an LTSS disability to choose to live in the community and lead an independent life, including the availability of an option to live in housing where the receipt of LTSS is not tied to tenancy" as a part of its definition of discrimination.

The legislation defines an "individual with an LTSS disability" as an individual with a disability who requires assistance in accomplishing activities of daily living, instrumental activities of daily living, or health-related tasks in order to live in the community, who is currently in an institutional placement or is at risk of institutionalization if that person does not receive community based long term services and supports.

The bill's definition of community is quite similar to the language in the definition of HCBS settings issued by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in the HCBS rule, with a couple of key differences, especially that no more than four unrelated individuals with an LTSS disability may reside in the same group or shared residence. This definition would not

supersede the CMS regulation—rather, Medicaid policy would still allow for states to provide HCBS in settings that meet the CMS definition, but they may not satisfy the DIA's requirements, in much the same way that Medicaid policy allows for activity that does not meet Olmstead requirements. Also similar to the relationship between Medicaid policy and the Olmstead mandate is the fact that under the Disability Integration Act, the Attorney General has the authority to enforce this law in a manner that is consistent with ADA enforcement. In other words, CMS would continue to determine whether a state Medicaid HCBS action is consistent with Medicaid policy; meanwhile, the US Department of Justice (DOJ) would determine whether such an action (along with non-Medicaid and even non-state-related actions) are consistent with DIA requirements.

The legislation requires that all public entities and LTSS insurance providers must complete a self-evaluation within six months after implementing regulations are released. Within one year of completing the self-evaluation, public entities must submit a transition plan for addressing the issues identified in the self-evaluation and achieving the purpose of this legislation. The plan must address these issues as soon as practicable, but public entities have up to 10 years to complete the plan. The Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Administration on Community Living (ACL), is charged with reviewing and approving state transition plans.

The prospects for passage of this bill are uncertain. The legislation is currently before the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions (HELP).

GAO Includes Medicaid Recommendations in Report on Government Fragmentation, Overlap, and Duplication

The Government Accountability Office (GAO) has released its annual report to Congress on "Additional Opportunities to Reduce Fragmentation, Overlap, and Duplication and Achieve Other Financial Benefits." The report contains three areas of recommendations regarding Medicaid.

GAO suggests that "federal spending on Medicaid demonstrations could be reduced by billions of dollars if the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) improved the process for reviewing, approving, and making transparent the basis for spending limits approved for Medicaid demonstrations, including better ensuring that valid methods are used to demonstrate budget neutrality and implemented other actions and recommendations, such as establishing specific criteria for assessing whether demonstration spending furthers Medicaid objectives." The watchdog agency also believes that "CMS should take steps to improve the oversight of state Medicaid payments to institutional providers and better ensure that the federal government does not provide funds for excessive state payments made to certain providers, which could result in savings of hundreds of millions of dollars annually." Both of these recommendations are holdovers from previous years. This year's report adds a recommendation regarding Medicaid Personal Care Services Data: "CMS needs timely, complete, and consistent data on Medicaid personal care services so it can effectively monitor these services, which could lead to savings of tens of millions of dollars annually."

Langevin Dear Colleague Letter Calls for DD Act Funding

Thirty-four Members of the House of Representatives signed onto a Dear Colleague letter authored by Representative James Langevin (D-RI) in support of the Developmental Disabilities Act programs: \$40 million for University Centers for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities, \$42 million for Protection and Advocacy Systems, and \$76 million for Councils on Developmental Disabilities. The letter points out that current funding levels have not kept pace with inflation.

Langevin and his colleagues cite the longer lifespans of individuals with developmental disabilities as introducing "new issues around aging and caregiving that must be met by the three programs." The letter also references the need for adequate funding for DD Act entities to "drive programs and policies that move people with developmental disabilities into competitive, integrated employment."

House Members Sign Letter Supporting Lifespan Respite Care Programs

Twenty-six Members of the House of Representatives have signed on to a bipartisan letter written by Representatives Jim Langevin (D-RI) and Gregg Harper (R-MS) in support of funding for the Lifespan Respite Care Act program. The letter points out that "the Lifespan Respite Care Act was authorized in 2006 as the only federal program to address respite issues for families regardless of age or disability."

The letter underlines the need for respite care in the US, and indicates that the lack of coordination between various programs that offer respite "continues to impede access to these crucial supports." The Representatives point out that the Lifespan Respite program, which "has already provided grants to 35 states and the District of Columbia," helps grantees to "coordinate federal, state and local resources and streamline the delivery of planned and emergency respite services." The signatories urge appropriators to include \$5 million fopr the program in the FY18 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations bill.

CBO Scores AHCA

The nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has released its highly anticipated scoring of the American Health Care Act (AHCA), and many commentators have observed that several of the CBO's findings will make the legislation a tougher sell for Republicans. The CBO estimated that enacting the AHCA would reduce federal deficits by \$337 billion over the 2017-2026 period, largely based on an \$880 billion cut to Medicaid. The CBO also estimated that, by 2018, 14 million more people would be uninsured under the AHCA than under current law, the increase in the number of uninsured people relative to the number under current law would rise to 21 million in 2020 and then to 24 million in 2026. To estimate the budgetary effects, CBO and JCT projected how the legislation would change the number of people who obtain federally subsidized health insurance through Medicaid, the nongroup market, and the employment-based market, as well as many other factors.

CBO estimates that several major provisions affecting Medicaid would decrease direct spending by \$880 billion over the 2017-2026 period. That reduction would stem primarily from lower enrollment throughout the period, culminating in 14 million fewer Medicaid enrollees by 2026, a reduction of about 17 percent relative to the number under current law. Some of that decline would be among people who are currently eligible for Medicaid benefits, and some would be among people who CBO projects would be made eligible by additional states adopting the optional expansion of eligibility authorized by the ACA before 2020, when the legislation would terminate the enhanced federal matching rate for new enrollees under the expansion of Medicaid and would place a per capita-based cap on the federal government's payments to states for medical assistance provided through Medicaid.

Per Capita-Based Cap on Medicaid Payments for Medical Assistance. CBO also indicated that he per capita cap limit on federal Medicaid reimbursement would reduce outlays because "Medicaid spending would grow on a per-enrollee basis at a faster rate than the CPI-M (Medical component of the Consumer Price Index)." According to CBO's projections, Medicaid spending would increase at an average annual rate of 4.4 percent while the CPI-M would grow 3.7 percent per year over the 2017-2026 period. With less federal reimbursement for Medicaid, CBO predicts that "states would need to decide whether to commit more of their own resources to finance the program at current-law levels or whether to reduce spending by cutting payments to health care providers and health plans, eliminating optional services, restricting eligibility for enrollment, or (to the extent feasible) arriving at more efficient methods for delivering services." CBO anticipates that states would adopt a mix of those approaches, which would result in additional savings to the federal government.

CMS Administrator Verma, HHS Secretary Price Issue Statement to Governors on Medicaid Flexibility

New Administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Seema Verma and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Tom Price have issued a joint letter to the nation's Governors, outlining a vision of enhanced flexibility for states to administer their Medicaid programs. In the letter, Price and Verma commit to "ushering in a new era for the federal and state Medicaid partnership where states have more freedom to design programs that meet the spectrum of diverse needs of their Medicaid population." While focusing on "break[ing] down barriers," the letter also restates CMS's commitment to "certain mechanisms, which ensure state accountability," such as "budget neutrality for waivers and demonstration projects," and "reasonable public input processes and transparency guidelines." The letter describes "some of the key areas where [CMS] will improve collaboration with states and move towards more effective program management," including:

- Providing "reasonable timelines for home and community-based services transformation," although the letter does not specify any changes to current timeframes.
 Price and Verma do commit to "greater state involvement in the process of assessing compliance of specific settings."
- Making "the State Plan Amendment approval process more transparent, efficient, and less burdensome," improving the speed of waiver renewals.

Four GOP Governors Call for New Approach to Medicaid Reform Four GOP governors wrote congressional leaders Thursday saying that the American Health Care Act's (AHCA'S) approach to Medicaid would not work for states and suggesting a different approach. "It provides almost no new flexibility for states, does not ensure the resources necessary to make sure no one is left out, and shifts significant new costs to states," wrote Govs. John Kasich of Ohio, Rick Snyder of Michigan, Brian Sandoval of Nevada, and Asa Hutchinson of Arkansas.

The governors offer an alternative policy proposal that includes the following components:

- 1. States should be given a choice between the following options:
 - a. Enacting structural Medicaid reform by converting financing to a per capita cap or block grant model for one or more population groups. Regardless of which reform option a state elects, reform "must allow states an appropriate transition period and the opportunity to use a partial and/or multi-phase approach to implementation."
 - b. Defaulting to the current structure, with reduced federal financial participation for Medicaid expansion programs. Under this option, Medicaid expansion enrollees would be funded under the traditional match rate for that population.
- 2. The nature of the current federal-state relationship "needs to fundamentally change." Significant new state flexibility and control "will be required to effectively manage the financial risk associated with structural reform," and " will also enable states to design more innovative programs focused on achievement of state priorities and outcomes, rather than compliance with processes."

Under either per capita caps or block grants, enrollment would be optional and could be capped for some populations. However, certain populations would be mandatory and excluded from any enrollment caps. These include aged, blind, and disabled individuals, as well as children and pregnant women up to pre-Affordable Care Act (ACA) federal mandatory minimum eligibility standards.

Under a **per capita cap** option, "states would assume the increased risk associated with capped funding for benefits per Medicaid enrollee, but would continue to share risk with the federal government for population growth. This option would be based on federal match of expenditures by the state up to the amount(s) determined by the per capita cap(s). The model must be built upon a financing base that takes the most current data/expenditures into account when building base funding levels...including all federal funding earned through, or supported by, state contributions, provider taxes, and other local arrangements."

Each eligibility category would have its own per capita cap. A transition to this model would start "with the childless adult and parent populations for whom a state is receiving enhanced match, and could be followed by additional populations at the state's discretion." While states would be required to include any adult populations for whom they are receiving enhanced match, a state could choose to implement per capita caps for any of the following populations:

- 1. Childless adults;
- 2. Parents and caretaker relatives;
- 3. Children;
- 4. Pregnant women; and
- 5. Disabled and elderly.

The governors offer "several options for consideration in establishing per capita cap amounts and growth rates" and recommend that "the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) model each of the options below and provide estimated impact on a state-by-state and national level." The per capita growth rate "should account for the lack of control that states currently have of certain underlying costs (e.g. pharmacy, RHCs, FQHC PPS, Medicare Parts B & D)." The proposal calls for an annual adjustment of medical CPI "plus an additional percentage adjustment to address those underlying costs." However, the governors say, "reductions to this additional adjustment over medical CPI should be discussed as states receive additional

flexibilities to adequately address underlying costs." The governors also call for "an adjustment factor that would be triggered by specific national economic events."

Under a **block grant** option, a state would be required "to convert financing for the adult expansion population into a block grant and could choose to phase in other populations." Potential block grant populations are the same as those listed under the per capita cap model, "except for the disabled and elderly eligibility groups." A state that chooses one or more block grant option "will switch from the current federal matching arrangement to a financial maintenance-of-effort (MOE) for the populations covered by the block grant(s), based on state expenditures in a designated base year." States will be able "to access stable and predictable federal allotments by meeting a financial MOE based on a level of state spending. States that meet their financial MOE would be permitted to draw 100% of their available federal allotment. Therefore, as states become more efficient in the management of their Medicaid programs, they will be able to continue using federal dollars without committing additional state dollars."

Under this option, Medicaid would be split into several parts, most of which would be block grant-eligible. States would have full control over the service delivery system "and would be permitted to impose conditions of participation on the adult populations."

- Under a new Part A of Medicaid, the adult enhanced match populations, as well as other nonelderly, non-disabled populations a state chooses to include, would be served through a Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)-like model. Allotments to states would be capped and indexed. The funding formula would consist of several variables, including a national federal minimum per capita amount for adults and children to promote equity among the states, a state-specific per capita amount that reflects variations among states, and adjustments based on population growth and relative state poverty levels, regardless of whether a state had previously expanded Medicaid under the ACA or through a Section 1115 Demonstration Project.
- Under Part B, Long Term Services and Supports (LTSS) would be delivered through a separate program that would level the playing field between HCBS and institutional care. Funding would be indexed for elderly population growth, low-income population growth, and inflation. States would be "assured of stable and predictable levels of funding as they transition to new service delivery models and accelerate towards person-centered planning and supports."
- Under a new Part C, medical services for individuals with disabilities and low-income seniors, as well as any other populations whom a state does not include in Part A, would continue as under current law, regardless of which other block grants a state chooses to take. Federal funding would remain an open-ended match with no change in benefits for individuals with disabilities and low-income seniors, including the Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit for children with disabilities.

The proposal would also allow states to **retain the current financing structure of Medicaid.**Under this option, "Medicaid expansion enrollment at the enhanced federal match rate would be frozen, grandfathering all current enrollees at the enhanced rate for a period of time." All new enrollees would be funded under the traditional match rate for that population.

The governors also discuss redefining the federal-state partnership. As examples of "federal regulatory overreach" they include the new Medicaid managed care regulations, access requirements, mental health parity requirements, and the home and community-based services (HCBS) settings rule, and "strongly recommend that Congress suspend these rules and bring states to the table to best determine how to modify and operationalize the requirements being imposed upon states." The proposal suggests that "the federal rule-making and promulgation process should be reworked to incorporate the following two steps: 1. Engage states during the

pre-conceptual phase of work. 2. Establish a distinct process for state Medicaid leaders to review federal regulation and guidance prior to finalization to ensure the policies proposed are operationally sound." The governors call for "a shift from the focus on process to a focus on outcomes" wherein "states and the federal government should agree to a set of performance standards and the federal government should only intervene when those standards are not being met."

Some of the additional state authorities the governors feel are necessary to enable states to manage reform include:

- Enrollment Limits: As populations transition into per capita caps, "states should be given additional authority to freeze or reduce enrollment, with exceptions for certain population groups (aged, blind, and disabled individuals, as well as children and pregnant women up to mandatory minimums described above)."
- Conditions of Eligibility: States should "have the authority to impose conditions of eligibility to prevent the 'crowd-out' effect." This would include work requirements.
- Cost-Sharing: States should "have the authority to implement enforceable financial participation of enrollees," with higher limits "for the adult groups versus children, pregnant women, ABD, and duals, as well as tiered cost-sharing to discourage inappropriate use of higher cost services and settings."
- Benefit Redesign: States "should be given the authority to design outcomes-based benefit packages," including "flexibility around LTSS services," such as "optional coverage of EPSDT, except for children with disabilities and children in custody" and restructuring or eliminating the requirement for statewideness and comparability "to allow states the flexibility to design and test pilot programs or target benefits to a specific population."
- Mandatory Managed Care: States "must have the option to mandatorily enroll all populations in managed care, with the exception of American Indians and Alaska Natives."

Toolkit to Assess Federal Medicaid Proposal

To assist states in assessing the potential implications of federal Medicaid proposals, the State Health and Value Strategies Program and Manatt Health have developed a toolkit providing state-by-state data on Medicaid enrollment and expenditure trends-factors that are central to establishing the amount each state would be allocated under capped funding proposals. While the resource was developed before the American Health Care Act was made public, it still provides useful data for making predictions about how eaqch state will fare under the bill's per capita cap proposal, and an explanation of the relevance of each data set.

Kaiser Brief Assesses Impact of Medicaid Restructuring on People with Disabilities

A new brief from the Kaiser Family Foundation (KFF) explains the role that Medicaid plays for nearly 7 million nonelderly adults with disabilities in the U.S. and explores what the American Health Care Act (AHCA) could mean for their health care and coverage. The brief

provides an excellent, detailed overview for policy-makers who may be unfamiliar with Medicaid's role in supporting people with disabilities,

KFF points out that Medicaid covers more than three in 10 nonelderly adults with disabilities, including people with physical disabilities, such as cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, and traumatic brain or spinal cord injuries; intellectual or developmental disabilities such as Down syndrome and autism; and mental illness. Over half who are enrolled in Medicaid live below the federal poverty level. They are four times as likely to receive nursing or other health care at home, and more than 1.5 times as likely to have 10 or more health care visits in a year compared to those with private insurance. The brief also explains that people with disabilities account for 15% of total Medicaid enrollment but 42% of program spending due to their greater health needs and more intensive service use.

KFF argues that "the changes to Medicaid in the House GOP bill – notably the end of enhanced funding for the ACA Medicaid expansion and the fundamental change in program financing to a per capita cap – carry significant implications for this population." While per capita cap financing could come with increased flexibility for states in subsequent legislation, KFF says, "the associated federal funding reductions over time may lead states to consider cuts in Medicaid eligibility, benefits, and provider reimbursement. Nonelderly adults with disabilities could be particularly affected by such cuts, as many rely on Medicaid coverage pathways and services that are offered at state option and have higher spending, due to their greater need for acute and long-term care services."

House Passes AHCA

The US House of Representatives has narrowly approved legislation to repeal and replace major parts of the Affordable Care Act. The vote, 217 to 213, with twenty Republicans voting against the bill, sends the American Health Care Act (AHCA) to an uncertain future in the Senate, where a handful of Republican senators immediately rejected it, signaling that they would start work on a new version of the bill virtually from scratch.

The AHCA, which had appeared to stall weeks ago, was revived by an amendment crafted by Congressman Tom MacArthur (R.--N.J.) to woo members of the conservative Freedom Caucus to vote for the bill. The proposal reinstates Essential Health Benefits (EHBs) as the federal standard, removing a confusing amendment adopted in late March that would have required states to define the essential health benefits package for purposes of premium tax credits. The amendment would also, in what could be perceived as a bid to shore up the support of moderates who were concerned about undermining access to care, maintain most of the Affordable Care Act's (ACA's) market reforms, including the

Prohibition on preexisting condition exclusions;

- Prohibition on discrimination based on gender;
- Guaranteed issue and renewability requirements;
- Coverage of adult children up to age 26 on their parent's plans; and
- Community rating, except as permitted by waiver.

However, the amendment would allow states to apply for waivers from the ACA's EHB requirements and many of the community rating rules. States would have to "attest" that their requested waiver was intended to "reduce premium costs, increase the number of persons with healthcare coverage, or advance another benefit to the public interest in the state, including the guarantee of coverage for persons with pre-existing medical conditions." The amendment provides that HHS "shall" approve applications within 90 days of determining the application complete.

While the MacArthur amendments provided the changes necessary to cobble together a Republican voting majority, the most significant provisions for state developmental disability service systems remain those that would impose a per capita cap on Medicaid spending. According to the most recent Congressional Budget Office (CBO) scoring of the AHCA, the Medicaid provisions would reduce federal support to states for Medicaid by \$839 billion over the 10 year period from 2017 to 2026. These savings would be achieved by ending the financing formula of federal matching rates and replacing it with state options for a per capita cap or block grant. The per capita cap would be adjusted annually by the Medical Consumer Price Index (CPI) for all eligibility groups, plus an additional 1 percent only for the aged and disabled eligibility groups for 2020 and subsequent years.

Although the AHCA is highly unlikely to pass the Senate in its current form, and indeed, as noted above, may be replaced entirely by a Senate-crafted bill, the per capita cap proposal does not appear to be one of the more controversial provisions of the bill within the Republican caucus. Although the timeline is constantly shifting, the most recent expectation on Capitol Hill is that the Senate will produce a bill in the next few weeks, and hope to complete voting before the August recess. Rather than locate development of a Senate version of the AHCA in the relevant committees, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R—KY) has created an ad hoc working group to draft a bill. The group includes McConnell and three other members of the Republican leadership: John Cornyn of Texas, the majority whip; John Thune of South Dakota, the chairman of the Senate Republican Conference; and John Barrasso of Wyoming, the chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, who has been a point man for the party on health care. The group also includes three committee chairmen: Orrin Hatch of Utah, chairman of the Finance Committee; Senator Lamar Alexander of Tennessee, chairman of the Health, Education, Labor and Pensions (HELP) committee; and Senator Michael B. Enzi of Wyoming, the head of the Budget Committee. The other senators in the Republican working group are from states that have expanded Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act: Tom Cotton of Arkansas, Cory Gardner of Colorado, Rob Portman of Ohio and Patrick J. Toomey of Pennsylvania.

Truven Releases Annual Report on Medicaid LTSS Expenditures

Truven Health Analytics has issued its annual report on Medicaid long-term services and supports (LTSS) expenditures, documenting Medicaid's significant role in LTSS. The report presents data for federal fiscal year (FY) 2015 along with updates for FY 2012 through 2014, and compares recent trends to historical patterns.

Total Medicaid LTSS expenditures were \$158 billion in FY 2015, a four percent increase from FY 2014, continuing the recent trend of historically low LTSS spending growth. HCBS have

accounted for all Medicaid LTSS growth in recent years while institutional service expenditures have been flat. HCBS spending increased seven percent in FY 2015, while institutional service spending decreased less than 0.1.

The percentage of total Medicaid LTSS spent on HCBS increased from 53 percent in FY 2014 to 55 percent in FY 2015. The number of states in which HCBS were a majority of expenditures increased from 25 in FY 2014 to 28 in FY 2015. Managed care accounted for 18 percent of FY 2015 LTSS spending. LTSS provided through managed care continued to grow more rapidly than overall Medicaid LTSS, increasing 24 percent in FY 2015 from \$23 billion to \$29 billion.

Another trend is the increased use of relatively new Medicaid State Plan authorities and demonstrations—state plan HCBS (section 1915(i)), self-directed personal assistance services (section 1915(j)), community first choice (section 1915(k)), health homes (section 1945), and the Money Follows the Person Demonstration. In FY 2015, spending for these authorities grew 57 percent from \$5.9 billion to \$9.3 billion, driven primarily by new states implementing the community first choice benefit.

The percentage of LTSS expenditures for HCBS continued to vary across population groups. HCBS accounted for 76 percent of spending in programs targeting people with developmental disabilities, compared to 44 percent of expenditures for programs targeting older adults and people with physical disabilities and 42 percent for behavioral health services provided to people with mental health and substance use disorders. HCBS spending for all three populations increased relative to institutional services in FY 2015.

Accompanying the report are numerous data tables that summarize national and state-level expenditures by service category and state. These tables document state variation in Medicaid LTSS, including overall expenditures growth, the balance between institutional and HCBS spending, the use of new program authorities, differences in data by target population, and the use of managed care.

Family Caregivers Act Introduced in Senate

Last week, Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Baldwin (D-WA) introduced S. 1028, the Recognize, Assist, Include, Support, and Engage (RAISE) Family Caregivers Act. The bill will be marked up by the Senate HELP Committee on Wednesday, May 10.

The RAISE Family Caregivers Act would implement the federal Commission on Long-Term Care's bipartisan recommendation that Congress require the development of a national strategy to support family caregivers. This strategy would include actions that the federal government, state and local governments, communities, healthcare, long-term services and supports and other providers, employers, and others can take to assist family caregivers. The bill also provides for an advisory council to help develop the national strategy in an effective way. This council will include representation from diverse stakeholders such as family caregivers, older adults with long-term needs, persons with disabilities, advocates for caregivers and those with care needs, and health care and social service providers, among others.

CMS Grantee Develops Self-Direction Curriculum for Case Managers

To assist states and health plans, the Integrated Care Resource Center, with support from the former National Resource Center for Participant-Directed Services (NRCPDS), has developed Self-Direction of Home- and Community-Based Services: A Training Curriculum for Case

Managers. The curriculum is a product of the Integrated Care Resource Center, funded by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). The Integrated Care Resource Center is a national initiative helping states improve the quality and cost-effectiveness of care for Medicare-Medicaid enrollees. The state technical assistance activities provided by the Integrated Care Resource Center are coordinated by Mathematica Policy Research and the Center for Health Care Strategies (CHCS).

The webinars and accompanying resources in the curriculum provide an overview of self-direction, considerations for the design and implementation of a self-direction program, and best practices for oversight of a self-direction program in a managed care context. The curriculum also provides several tools to help case managers explain the self-direction option and the related responsibilities of individuals choosing this option. In addition, there is information for health plans to help individuals determine if the self-direction option is right for them.

CMS Releases Annual 372 Data Report

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has released its annual report presenting information from the CMS 372 reports for 1915(c) waivers. The report, produced by Truven, covers waiver years ending in 2013 and 2014, and presents trend data for section 1915(c) waivers starting with 2009. According to the report, over 1.6 million people received section 1915(c) waiver services in 2014, a five

percent increase from 1.5 million in 2013, and the number of section 1915(c) waiver participants has increased by an average of four percent per year since 2009.

Participants received services for an average of 10 months in 2014, as in previous years. Average waiver expenditures per person were \$26,055, 72 percent of total Medicaid spending for these individuals (\$36,039). Average waiver expenditures, Truven points out, "have been almost flat since 2009, with an average annual increase of less than half a percent." Total Medicaid expenditures per waiver participant grew slightly more quickly, one percent per year from 2009 through 2014. Waiver expenditures accounted for only 72 percent of total Medicaid expenditures for waiver participants in 2014, compared to 76 percent in 2009.

Section 1915(c) waiver data by targeted population group have changed little over the years when adjusting for overall participant growth. In all years, a majority of participants received services in waivers targeting older adults and/or people with physical disabilities (54 percent in 2014). Most of the remaining participants received supports from waivers targeting people with developmental disabilities (43 percent in 2014). Older adults and people with physical disabilities received section 1915(c) waiver services for a shorter duration of time (nine months) than people with developmental disabilities (11 months). Waivers targeting people with developmental disabilities accounted for \$30 billion in 2014, 71 percent of all section 1915(c) waiver expenditures, reflecting higher average costs per participant for this population. Most of the remaining spending, 27 percent, was targeted to older adults and/or people with physical disabilities (\$11 billion). Waivers targeting people with brain injuries, medically fragile children, people with HIV/AIDS, and people with serious mental illness or serious emotional disturbance comprise approximately three percent of section 1915(c) waiver participants and two percent of waiver expenditures.

Accompanying the report are tables that display 2013 and 2014 data for each section 1915(c) waiver, followed by state-level data for total participants and for each target population. State-level tables rank states according to the proportion of total state residents who received section 1915(c) waiver services.

CMS Releases Annual LTSS Beneficiaries Report

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has released its annual report on long term supports and services (LTSS) spending in Medicaid. The latest report analyzes 2013 data. According to the report, "Medicaid Long-Term Services and Supports Beneficiaries in 2013," prepared by Truven, approximately 5.2 million people received Medicaid-funded long-term services and supports (LTSS) during calendar year 2013.

This estimate is greater than the 4.8 million or 4.9 million LTSS beneficiaries

estimated in LTSS beneficiary reports for 2010 through 2012 because 2013 data for the first time include state-reported estimates for managed LTSS programs other than the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE). Data in this report, Truven points out, "still should be considered underestimates of Medicaid institutional LTSS and home and community-based services (HCBS) beneficiaries" because "only eight states provided managed care beneficiary data for this report, fewer than half of the 18 states that provided LTSS through managed care programs during 2013."

Most LTSS beneficiaries (3.7 million or 72 percent) received Home and Community Based Services (HCBS), including about 223,000 people (four percent) who also received institutional services during the year. About 1.7 million individuals (33 percent) received institutional services, including people who also received HCBS during the year. In 28 states, between 60 and 80 percent of beneficiaries used HCBS.

A majority of beneficiaries were under age 65, including both children and youth under age 21 (16 percent) and people age 21 through 64 (40 percent). Older adults comprised 44 percent of beneficiaries. In each age group, a majority of individuals received HCBS, including people who received both HCBS and institutional services. Older adults were less likely to receive HCBS than people under age 65: only 54 percent of LTSS beneficiaries age 65 or older received HCBS compared to 82 percent of people age 21 through 64 and 86 percent of children and youth.

Senate Passes Budget Resolution

The Senate has passed an FY 2018 Budget Resolution by a near party line vote of 51 to 49. The measure includes reconciliation instructions to ease passage of tax reform, a priority for Republican lawmakers and President Trump. Though the budget resolution does not actually set the budget, it provides guidelines for federal spending and revenue bills and, through the reconciliation instructions, fast-tracks certain committee and Congressional action for this fiscal year.

The reconciliation instructions call on the Senate Finance Committee and appropriate House committees to develop legislation that increases the deficit by up to \$1.5 trillion over 10 years. That legislation would be exempt from filibuster rules and only require a simple majority (50) in the Senate to pass during FY 18. In addition to taxation, the Finance Committee has jurisdiction over Medicaid, Medicare, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families, and other health and human services programs. The Senate budget assumes over \$5 trillion in program cuts, including a nearly 30% cut in inflation adjusted dollars to non-defense discretionary (NDD) programs. Given the program areas under Finance's jurisdiction, the reconciliation instructions could be used to make another attempt at restructuring Medicaid financing.

The resolution now goes to the House, which is likely to pass it without changes.

SSI Payments to Increase in 2018

The Social Security Administration (SSA) has recently announced that there will be a two percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits in 2018. The maximum federal SSI payment for individuals will grow to \$750 per month from \$735 in 2017. For couples, the highest federal payment will be \$1,125 per month, up from \$1,103. Additionally, work incentive thresholds for Social Security and SSI beneficiaries with disabilities will see a nominal increase.

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

National Beneficiary Survey: Disability Statistics, 2015

The Social Security Administration's (SSA) Office of Retirement and Disability Policy has published the results of the 2015 National Beneficiary Survey (NBS). The survey supplements SSA records and provides extensive data on the employment efforts of Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) beneficiaries and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients. The survey was given to 4,062 beneficiaries ranging in age from 18 through full retirement and includes information on beneficiary characteristics and health, program and service participation, employment interest and activity, job characteristics, and benefits and employment interaction.

The Person-Centered Counseling Training Program

Racial, Ethnic, and Gender Disparities in Health Care in Medicare Advantage

CMS has released a new report analyzing disparities in the care received by Medicare Advantage beneficiaries from **2015-2016**. The report was compiled using information from the Healthcare Effectiveness Data and Information Set (HEDIS) and the Medicare Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (CAHPS) survey. It looks at differences in care by race, ethnicity, and gender, and also isolates racial and ethnic differences experienced by women and men.

With the exception of Asian and Pacific Islander (API) beneficiaries, beneficiaries who identified as a racial or ethnic minority were found to consistently experience worse or similar care when compared to their white counterparts. Overall, differences between men and women were negligible.

This report may be useful as a tool for spreading awareness about health disparities, designing interventions, and developing methods to ensure Medicaid programs are administered equitably across diverse populations.

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

I&R/A interactions, technology is transforming how Americans seek information. Social media, smartphones, mobile apps, ecommerce and other developments are changing expectations for how individuals access and receive information. Additionally, technology has the potential to enhance the administration of I&R/A programs in areas such as data sharing, call center management, and maintenance of resource databases. In this evolving field, the identification and sharing of promising practices can help strengthen our understanding of the role of technology in I&R/A programs that serve older adults, people with disabilities, and family and friend caregivers. In this context, the National Information and Referral Support Center, administered by the National Association of States United for Aging and Disabilities (NASUAD) and with funding provided in part by the Administration for Community Living, is launching this Technology in Practice contest to identify and disseminate promising practices on the use of technology in aging and disability I&R/A programs. NASUAD Publishes Primer on Budget Reconciliation and LTSS Programs

The National Association of States United for Aging and Disabilities (NASUAD) published a primer on budget reconciliation and long-term services and supports (LTSS) programs. With the inauguration of President Trump on January 20, 2017, Republicans now control the White House and both branches of Congress. As the new leadership begins work to fulfill their campaign promise of repealing the Affordable Care Act (ACA), the parliamentary budget reconciliation process has become the focal point of legislative strategies. Congress has passed a budget resolution that sets the stage for ACA repeal, using budget reconciliation legislation as the vehicle. While reconciliation is a powerful tool that can be used to pass significant and sweeping legislation, it also has some stark limitations that restrict the type of changes that can be enacted. Nevertheless, reconciliation can be used to restructure significant components of Federal health and human services programs without requiring a 60-vote threshold in the Senate. Knowledge of the budgetary process and its associated rules will help constituents understand the types of changes that could be made to health and human services programs.

The Senate

Senate Judiciary Committee Approves Elder Abuse Prevention Bill

On Thursday, February 9th, the Senate Judiciary Committee unanimously approved the Elder Abuse Prevention and Prosecution Act (S. 178). The legislation creates new training requirements for Federal justice officials regarding elder abuse and exploitation, as well as requiring Federal districts to have designated staff to handle elder abuse cases. Additionally, the legislation includes new coordination and collaboration requirements, and increased penalties for individuals who target older adults for exploitation. The Elder Justice Coalition, of

which NASUAD is a member, has endorsed this act. The bill will be reported to the full Senate for a potential vote in the future.

Tom Price Confirmed as Secretary of Health and Human Services

Early this morning, the Senate confirmed Dr. Tom Price to be Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services under the Trump administration. The final vote was 52-47, with all of the Senate Republicans voting to confirm Dr. Price. No Democrats voted for confirmation. President Trump has previously stated that Dr. Price will lead the administration's work on developing policy to replace the Affordable Care Act. Prior to his appointment to HHS, Dr. Price was a Congressman representing Georgia in the House of Representatives. He served as Chairman of the House Committee on the Budget and was also a member of the House Ways and Means Committee. Price has been a fixture in conservative policy, including membership in the House Doctor and Tea Party Caucuses, as well as serving as the Chair of the Republican Study Committee in 2009-2010. As a Representative, Dr. Price introduced comprehensive <u>legislation</u> outlining his vision of an Affordable Care Act repeal and replace plan. The legislation proposed repealing the Affordable Care Act and replacing it with tax credits and health savings accounts. Notably, his legislation also allows individuals to opt out of public programs, such as Medicaid, Medicare, CHIP, Tri-Care, in order to receive these tax credits. Dr. Price is a physician and was a practicing orthopedic surgeon prior to his career in politics.

The House of Representatives

House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee Advances Medicaid Bills

On Tuesday, February 7th, the House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health advanced two pieces of Medicaidrelated legislation. These bills would place new restrictions on certain types of income and assets when determining eligibility for Medicaid. Energy and Commerce is the House committee with jurisdiction over the Medicaid program.

One piece of legislation addresses eligibility for Medicaid longterm services and supports. If passed, the legislation would require states to count income derived from some types of annuities towards the Medicaid eligibility of an institutionalized person. Under spousal impoverishment rules, states provide an allowance for the spouse of an individual receiving Medicaidfunded institutional LTSS. The proposed legislation would modify the method for counting income for when specified annuities are purchased during the 60-month "lookback period" prior to the individual applying for Medicaid. If passed, half of the income generated from these types of annuities would be counted when determining eligibility for the spouse in the institution.

The other bill deals with the treatment of lottery winnings and certain other lump-sum payments for the purposes of eligibility. Under Medicaid rules, income is counted on a "point-in-time" basis. Thus, large lump-sum payments could result in a person being Medicaid ineligible in the month that they received the income but obtaining or regaining eligibility in the following month. Under the proposed legislation, lump-sum payments exceeding \$80,000 would be prorated over multiple months for the purposes of determining Medicaid eligibility.

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

CMS Issues Guidance to States on Community First Choice

On December 30, 2016, The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) issued a State Medicaid Director (SMD) letter with guidance to the state Medicaid directors about the implementation of Community First Choice (CFC) State Plan Option. The CFC State Plan Option is a home and community-based (HCBS) benefit package available to states as an effort to promote integration in the community. Included in the letter are links to the state plan amendment (SPA) pre-print and technical guide for CFC. The technical guide provides detailed guidance regarding the different sections of the SPA pre-print, as well as the criteria that CMS will use to review and approve CFC amendments.

Of note, the SMD letter and associated guidance provide clarification of a couple of key issues related to the implementation and operation of the CFC. First, the letter provides guidance regarding the regulatory requirement stating that unpaid supports cannot be required as a replacement for paid LTSS. CMS clarifies that this requirement does not force states to reimburse for previously unpaid care or to exceed the authorized hours of care. Instead, the provision means that unpaid supports cannot be compelled as a condition of CFC. CMS also provides guidance on the availability of CFC service and administrative matching funds. CMS also clarifies the ability to offer CFC-like services through 1115 demonstrations, but notes that states can only secure the 6% increase in Federal matching funds via an approved CFC SPA. Additionally, the technical guide provides information about standard questions that will be asked of all CFC applications regarding the settings where CFC services are provided. These questions are to ensure that the settings meet the integration requirements included in the HCBS final rule.

CMS Releases RFI Regarding PACE-Like Models of Care

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released a Request for Information (RFI) to gather information for the possible development of a model test under the PACE Innovation Act of 2015 (PIA). The RFI seeks comment about the elements of a PACE-like model test and types of technical assistance that organizations and states would require for "individuals dually

eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, age 21 and older, with disabilities that impair their mobility and who are assessed as requiring a nursing home level of care and meet other eligibility criteria." Additionally, the RFI seeks comments about any additional populations whose health outcomes could benefit from enrollment in the PACE-like models and ways the PACE model could be adapted to serve these populations. CMS is seeking feedback from all interested parties. All comments must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. ET on February 10, 2017. Congress Reconvenes and Begins ACA Repeal Process

On January 3rd, the House and Senate reconvened after the end of the year recess and swore in newly elected members for the 115th Congressional session. Shortly after swearing in, the Republican majority began the process of fulfilling their campaign promises to repeal the Affordable Care Act. The first step was the introduction and passage of a budget resolution, which establishes the framework for the parliamentary process known as reconciliation. Under reconciliation, the Senate can pass measures with a direct impact on spending and/or revenue with a simple majority instead of the 60 votes generally required in the chamber.

The House passed its resolution on Tuesday, while the Senate made a procedural vote on Wednesday that will allow a final vote on the resolution next week. After passage of the budget resolution, leadership in both chambers will begin the process of developing specific language that repeals portions of the ACA. As such, the breadth and scope of the repeal as well as the effective date of such changes remain unknown. Democrats have begun messaging regarding the potential harms of the bill in order to develop grassroots opposition to ACA repeal. Democrats have also expressed hope that they may be able to use procedural maneuvers and rules regarding reconciliation to delay the legislation and to limit parts of the ACA that are impacted. However, the minority party is unlikely to prevent legislation from becoming law as Republican control of both chambers means that the majority party can pass the reconciliation package without any Democratic support.

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

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

CMS Issues Guidance to States on Community First Choice

On December 30, 2016, The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) issued a State Medicaid Director (SMD) letter with guidance to the state Medicaid directors about the implementation of Community First Choice (CFC) State Plan Option. The CFC State Plan Option is a home and community-based (HCBS) benefit package available to states as an effort to promote integration in the community. Included in the letter are links to the state plan amendment (SPA) pre-print and technical guide for CFC. The technical guide provides detailed guidance regarding the different sections of the SPA pre-print, as well as the criteria that CMS will use to review and approve CFC amendments.

Of note, the SMD letter and associated guidance provide clarification of a couple of key issues related to the implementation and operation of the CFC. First, the letter provides guidance regarding the regulatory requirement stating that unpaid supports cannot be required as a replacement for paid LTSS. CMS clarifies that this requirement does not force states to reimburse for previously unpaid care or to exceed the authorized hours of care. Instead, the provision means that unpaid supports cannot be compelled as a condition of CFC. CMS also provides guidance on the availability of CFC service and administrative matching funds. CMS also clarifies the ability to offer CFC-like services through 1115 demonstrations, but notes that states can only secure the 6% increase in Federal matching funds via an approved CFC SPA. Additionally, the technical guide provides information about standard questions that will be asked of all CFC applications regarding the settings where CFC services are provided. These questions are to ensure that the settings meet the integration requirements included in the HCBS final rule.

Lawmakers Work to Develop ACA Replacement Strategies

This week, Republican lawmakers gathered in Philadelphia to work on several legislative issues including developing a health care strategy. Republicans have begun legislative maneuvers that will enable them to repeal the Affordable Care Act (ACA) with a simple majority, thereby not needing any Democratic support. The majority party has not yet provided specifics about their replacement plans, and continue discussing options at the meeting. On Thursday, President Trump provided some high level thoughts, including the likely inclusion of health savings accounts (HSA) coupled with high deductible health plans (HDHP) in the ACA replacement. Other ideas under discussion

include the use of high risk pools as an option for individuals with pre-existing conditions.

Earlier in the week, a group of Republican Senators released a separate replacement proposal. The proposal would allow states to select from three options, including keeping the ACA intact; using Federal money that would have been spent on ACA to implement a system of HSA/HDHP coverage; or implementing a state-only solution without any Federal funding. Leaders in Congress have not yet opined on the legislation and whether it is a viable option for replacement. Meanwhile, other discussions surrounding potential replacement bills are ongoing. The issue is likely to remain on the forefront of Congressional activity as Republicans work to finalize repeal and replacement plans over the next several months.

From the White House

Trump Administration Enacts Several Policies in First Week

During the first week of his administration, President Trump signed a number of executive orders enacting sweeping changes to the Federal government. Most significantly to health and human services programs, the President directed agencies to seek ways to limit the impact of the Affordable Care Act, implemented a halt on new regulations, and enacted a Federal hiring freeze.

The order on ACA does not provide policy specifics, but instructs Federal agencies to seek authority within current law toprovide waivers and exemptions that lessen the burden of ACA policies on a variety of health care entities, patients, and businesses. This order is intended to begin the transition away from ACA as Congress works to repeal the statute. The halt on regulations directs agency heads to refrain from sending new rules to the Federal Register until they have been reviewed by a new appointee. Additionally, agencies are directed to withdraw rules that were sent to the Federal register and not yet published, and delay the effective date of rules that were issued but not yet in effect. Lastly, the hiring freeze prevents Federal agencies from bringing in new staff for at least the next 90 days. During that period, the Office of Management and Budget is instructed to come up with a long-range plan to reduce the Federal workforce through attrition. The hiring freeze will end once the plan has been implemented.

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

Working Together Toward Better Health Outcomes

Informational Bulletin on Medicaid Managed Care Rule Compliance

On **June 30th**, **2017**, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released an information bulletin to states regarding compliance with the Medicaid managed care final rule. CMS believes that some of the new rules are potentially burdensome to states, and so intends to use its enforcement discretion to work with states to implement state-specific compliance solutions, based on state needs and circumstances. If a state is interested in taking advantage of CMS' enforcement flexibility, the state will need to identify to their regional office the particular regulation(s) that they will be unable to implement by the mandated compliance date. Once identified, CMS will then work with the state to assess compliance with those regulations in the following ways:

- The specific goals and intent for the regulation;
- Compliance with regulatory standards that were in effect prior to the Medicaid managed care rule publication in 2016;
- Alternatives the state could consider in moving toward compliance and strategies for how states can best mitigate specific risks and concerns with non-compliance; and,
- Developing a timeline for future compliance with the regulatory requirement.

Notwithstanding the above-noted flexibility, CMS will not provide additional flexibility for the following provisions:

- The actuarial soundness and payment provisions found in §§ 438.4, 438.5, 438.6, and 438.7;
- The pass-through payment provisions found in §438.6(d); and
- The medical loss ratio (MLR) provisions found in §§ 438.8 and 438.74.

Overtime Rule No Longer Supported

On **Friday**, **June 30th**, **2017**, the Trump Administration filed court documents signaling that they will no longer defend the Department of Labor (DOL) overtime rule that was released in **May 2016** under the previous administration. The overtime rule would have roughly doubled the salary threshold for overtime exemptions to \$47,476, but was put on hold by an injunction from the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Texas. DOL is expected to release a new request for comments in order to develop a new overtime proposal.

National Institute on Aging

Promising but Inconclusive Evidence on Interventions to Prevent Cognitive Decline

The National Institute on Aging commissioned a committee of experts through the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine to conduct an extensive scientific review and provide recommendations in order to better understand what actually might prevent or reduce risk of cognitive decline or dementia. There have been a wide range of programs and products, such as diets, exercise regimens, games, and supplements, which claim to help with these conditions. However, through their scientific review, the committee did not find sufficient evidence to recommend specific interventions to

prevent cognitive decline or dementia. Although, they did note "encouraging" evidence for three types of interventions: cognitive training, blood pressure control for people with hypertension, and increased physical activity.

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

Request for Public Comment on Proposed Revisions for the Older Americans Act Annual State Program Performance Report

Public comment is now open for the proposed revisions for the Older Americans Act Title III and VII, Chapters 3 and 4 Annual State Program Performance Report (SPR). On **Thursday**, **June 1**, **2017**, ACL released these proposed revisions. The Notice of

Comment Request is now on display in the Federal Register (Vol. 82, No. 104, page 25293 -25294).

For the first time since 2005, the SPR and the software system used to submit the SPR are being redesigned. The proposed revised SPR will collect quantitative data from State Units on Aging (SUAs) on the Older Americans Act Title III and Title VII Chapters 3 and 4 programs. This data collection will fulfill requirements of the OAA and the Government Performance and Results Modernization Act (GPRA Modernization Act) of 2010 and related program performance activities.

Updated ACL Public Access Plan

ACL has updated its Public Access Plan that was originally published in **February 2016**. The purpose of the Public Access Plan is to make peer-reviewed publications and scientific data available to the public, arising from research funded in whole or part by ACL through the National Institute on Disability, Independent Living, and Rehabilitation Research (NIDILRR). The updated Public Access Plan includes public access to the scientific data component, and ACL will begin implementing the new component **October 1**, **2017**.

CMS Issues Proposed Revision Requirements for Long-Term Care Facilities' Arbitration Agreements On **October 4, 2016**, the Reform of Requirements for Long-Term Care Facilities Final Rule was published. This rule prohibited pre-dispute agreements for binding arbitration. The court granted a preliminary injunction on **November 7, 2016**, after the American Health Care Association and a group of nursing homes sued for preliminary and permanent injunction to stop CMS from enforcing this requirement.

Since then, CMS has reconsidered the arbitration requirements in the 2016 Final Rule, and CMS has issued new proposed revisions to arbitration agreement requirements for long-term care facilities. Overall, CMS states that these new proposed revisions would help strengthen transparency in the arbitration process, reduce unnecessary provider burden and support residents' rights to make informed decisions about important aspects of their health care.

This proposed rule is scheduled to be published on **June 8th**, **2017** and comments are due by **August 7th**, **2017**.

2017 Spousal Impoverishment Standards

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has recently released an informational bulletin related to the 2017 Spousal Impoverishment Standards. In 1988, Congress enacted provisions to prevent "spousal impoverishment," or when the spouse who is still living at home in the community is left with little or no income or resources. Under the Medicaid spousal impoverishment provisions, a certain amount of the couple's combined resources is protected for the spouse living in the community. This informational bulletin includes the minimum and maximum amount of resources and income that can be protected for a spouse in the community in 2017.

Strategies to Streamline Transitions for Medicaid-Eligible Beneficiaries Who Newly Qualify for Medicare

On **June 7th, 2017**, CMS issued an Informational Bulletin to promote smooth transitions for individuals in the adult group who become Medicare eligible. The bulletin discusses the required processes for completing redeterminations of eligibility when Medicaid adult group beneficiaries turn 65 or attain Medicare eligibility. Additionally, CMS highlights opportunities for states to promote smooth transitions for these beneficiaries while reducing administrative burden on them and states.

Workplace Accommodations: Low Cost, High Impact

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Amendments Act and regulations from the Equal Employment Opportunity
Commission redirected attention on workplace accommodations by widening the definition of disability; more coverage means more employees will be entitled to workplace accommodations.
This increased attention has caused some employers concern about the costs of providing disability accommodations to employees. However, the Job Accommodation Network (JAN), a service of the U.S. Department of Labor's Office of Disability Employment Policy (ODEP), released its most recent study entitled "Workplace Accommodations: Low Cost, High Impact" that indicates that workplace accommodations are not only low cost, but also have a positive impact on the work environment. The study also found that the typical small expenditures for

disability accommodations generally pay form themselves in the form of reduced training costs and worker's compensation, and increased morale and productivity. The JAN study has been an ongoing research study since 2004 and represents a wide array of industry sectors and sizes.

Issue Brief: Older Americans Likely to See the Largest Changes in their Health Insurance under the AHCA

A new issue brief from the Kaiser Family Foundation discusses how older adults are likely to see some of the largest changes in their health insurance under the American Health Care Act (AHCA) that was recently passed by the House of Representatives. It is projected that Americans ages 50 - 64 who are uninsured would rise to 10 million in 2026, doubling the current proportion of those who are currently uninsured. Along with this projection, it is also estimated that many of those who currently have coverage would see an increase in premiums before 2026.

The Kaiser Family Foundation's report explains the AHCA provisions that would redesign the private healthcare market so it is more similar to the pre-Affordable Care Act age, when those in the fifties and sixties were at a high risk of facing unaffordable healthcare premiums and being uninsured. Under the AHCA, insurers will have more freedom to charge older adults higher premiums. They will also have new waivers under which States could opt out of certain ACA insurance market rules, and there will be changes in the way tax credits are calculated. According to the Congressional Budget Office, these changes could cause some

older Americans to see increases in out of pocket expenses for insurance premiums by the thousands of dollars per year.

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

Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services

Health and Welfare of Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Waiver Recipients

In January 2018, the Administration for Community Living (ACL) joined the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Inspector General (OIG) and the HHS Office of Civil Rights to produce a report on ensuring beneficiary health and safety in group homes through state implementation of comprehensive compliance oversight. This report was intended to serve as a resource for states as they work to ensure that all group homes are safe and healthy places for people with disabilities.

On **June 28, 2018,** CMS released an informational bulletin addressing the findings of the OIG/OCR/ACL Joint Report on state oversight of group homes. In the newly released informational bulletin, CMS urges states to review the recommendations included in the report and incorporate them into their critical incident management and quality assurance processes.

EVV Good Faith Effort Exemption Requests

The deadline for the implementation of EVV is **January 1**, **2019**. However, states may apply for a 1-year delay through the 'good-faith' exemption. **On June 28**, **2018**, CMS posted clarification on <u>Medicaid.gov</u> regarding the process of applying for this exemption. This guidance goes over the instructions for requesting a delay and the necessary content that a state should include in its application.

Only one request may be filed by a state between **July 1** - **November 30, 2018**.

If you have not yet received this card, you should either sign into MyMedicare.gov to see if the card has been mailed, or Call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) to check on its status.

CMS is continuing to mail cards to Wave 2 states and territories (Alaska, American Samoa, California, Guam, Hawaii, Northern Mariana Islands, Oregon), and those who are new to Medicare. CMS has now begun mailing cards to people with Medicare who live in Wave 3 states: Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas,

Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

All cards will be delivered by April 2019.

U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging Seeks Comments on Guardianship

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

A Profile of Older Americans: 2016

On March 15, 2017, ACL released the annual summary of the latest statistics on the older population, A Profile of Older Americans:2016 covers 15 topical areas including population, income and poverty, living arrangements, education, health, and caregiving. Principal sources of data for the Profile are the U.S. Census Bureau, the National Center for Health Statistics, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The Profile incorporates the latest data available. Some of the highlights from the Profile include:



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- From 2005 to 2015, the population of adults over the age of 65 in the U.S. increased from over 36 million in 2005, to close to 48 million in 2015 - a 30 percent increase;
- Approximately 15 percent of the U.S. population is now an older American;
- Roughly 29 percent of noninstitutionalized older adults live alone, including almost half of women age 75 and older:
- Social Security provided 90 percent or more of the income received by 33 percent of beneficiaries in 2014; and
- Over 4.2 million older Americans, or 8.8 percent, were below the poverty level in 2015.

Centers for Independent Living Annual Program Performance Report Open for Public Comment

Issue Brief: Opportunities to Improve Nutrition for Older Adults and Reduce Risk of Poor Health Outcomes

CMS Releases Letter to States on Section 1332 Innovation Waivers

On March 13, 2017, CMS sent a letter to states on Section 1332 of the Affordable Care Act (ACA). Section 1332 State Innovation Waivers give states increased flexibility to provide services under their state Medicaid programs as long as the waiver will provide coverage that is at least as comprehensive and affordable as before the waiver, and also does not increase the federal deficit.

CMS encourages states that are interested in pursuing a Section 1332 Waiver to reach out to the relevant Departments soon in order to gain assistance in developing their waivers.

CMS Announces New Educational Initiative to Raise Awareness of Chronic Care Management

On March 15, 2017, the CMS Office of Minority Health (CMS OMH) and the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy at the Health Resourses and Service Administration (HRSA) announced a new educational initiative call Connected Care, which aims to raise awareness of the benefits of chronic care management (CCM) services for Medicare beneficiaries with multiple chronic conditions. Connected Care is a part of a nationwide effort to better serve Medicare beneficiaries under fee-for-service with a particular focus on racial and ethnic minorities and rural populations, which generally have higher incidence of chronic diseases. CMS Releases RTI Evaluation of Initiative to Reduce Avoidable Hospitalizations among Nursing Facility Residents

On March 7, 2017, CMS released a new evaluative report from RTI on the Initiative to Reduce Avoidable Hospitalizations among Nursing Facility Residents, which indicated some promising results. For the second consecutive year, all seven long-term care (LTC) facility partners taking part in the initiative indicated a decline in all-cause hospitalizations as well as potentially avoidable hospitalizations, when compared to a comparison group.

Additionally, MDS-based quality measures did not show any pattern of change in regard to the Initiative, which suggests that the lower hospitalization rates are not generally leading to a decrease in quality of care for individuals residing in a LTC facility.

Congressional Budget Office

CBO Releases Score of the American Health Care Act The Congressional Budget Office has released its official scoreof the American Health Care Act, which is the legislation that would repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act. As a reminder, a CBO score is the official estimate of impacts of a piece of legislation under consideration in congress. These are the numbers that will be used when discussing the effects of this legislation for purposes of budgeting, the number of people covered, etc. The most basic summary is that the bill is expected to save the federal government money while increasing the number of uninsured individuals in the country.

In summary: The bill is expected to reduce government revenues by \$900 billion over the 10 year period from 2017-2026, primarily due to repealing the majority of the ACA taxes. Despite the reduced revenues, the legislation would save the Federal government \$300 billion since it reduces spending on health care and Medicaid by a total of \$1.2 trillion over that period. The bulk of these savings comes from reducing Medicaid expenditures. CBO estimates that the bill will reduce total Medicaid spending by 1/4 of the projected amount in 2026, for a total reduction of \$880 billion in Federal spending. This amount would presumably be increased by states reducing their share of spending on the program in response to the limit in Federal spending. CBO's projections estimate that 14 million fewer individuals would be served by Medicaid under this legislation, and there would be 24 million more uninsured people overall by 2026.

Substantial savings would also come from the repeal of the ACA subsidies (the advance premium tax credits) and the implementation of less generous refundable tax credits in the AHCA. The repeal of ACA credits would save \$673 billion, which would be offset by \$361 billion for new tax credits - resulting in a total saving of \$312 billion over the ten-year period. The legislation is also expected to increase insurance premiums in the short term due to healthier people exiting the market, but decrease them in the long-run because of the reduced mandates regarding covered benefits and actuarial equivalency in the marketplace. CBO specifically notes that the premiums will decrease substantially for younger people, but will likely increase for individuals in their 50s and 60s due to insurers being able to charge older adults more under this bill than the ACA allowed

MACPAC Issues March 2017 Report to Congress

On March 15, 2017, MACPAC released its March 2017 report to Congress, which included a new analysis of 2014 data that indicates declines in hospital uncompensated care but also continued financial stress for safety-net providers. Specifically, aggregate hospital uncompensated care decreased by \$4.6 billion between 2013 and 2014, with the most significant declines found in states that expanded Medicaid.

As a part of the report MACPAC provides nine recommendations to Congress, which includes a recommendation to extend the CHIP program for another five years through fiscal year 2022.

Senate Approves President Trump's Nominee to Lead CMS

On March 13th, 2017, the U.S. Senate confirmed President Trump's nominee to head the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), Seema Verma, on a vote of 55 to 43. Ms. Verma will oversee an agency that accounts for approximately a trillion dollars in health care spending each year.

Prior to her confirmation, Ms. Verma was the founder and CEO of SVC Inc., a private health care consultancy that worked with a number of different states on Medicaid waivers.

President's 2018 Budget Blueprint

President Trump Releases Budget Blueprint for 2018

On March 16th, 2017, President Trump released a "Budget Blueprint" for 2018. This "skinny budget" provided a broad outline of his proposed budget. The budget blueprint propose topline spending of approximately \$1.1 trillion. As expected, the White House proposed a \$54 billion increase in military spending, with corresponding decreases in many domestic programs.

Highlights include:

- A \$15.1 billion decrease in funding for Health and Human Services funding
 - · No details on ACL funding were included
- Proposed elimination of the following programs
 - SCSEP Senior Community Service Employment Program
 - CDBG Community Development Block Grant
 - LIHEAP Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program

NIDILRR has released its February jobs report for individuals with disabilities, and notes that Americans with disabilities

continue to contribute to job gains. The report notes that the employment-to-population ratio for working-age people with disabilities increased from 26 percent in February 2016, to over 28 percent in February 2018. 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



House of Representatives Moves to Vote on ACA Repeal

On Monday, March 20th, the House of Representatives released amendments to the American Health Care Act, which is the legislation that would repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act. The amendments contain significant changes to Medicaid policies, including an option (but not a requirement) for states to receive some Medicaid funding in a block-grant rather than in a per-capita cap format. These block grants would only apply to children and some childless adults (but not the ACA expansion group). Older adults and people with disabilities are not included in the block grant option. The amendments also increase the inflationary factor applied to the per capita caps for older adults and people with disabilities and create a new option for states to apply work requirements to non-disabled adults. Additionally, the amendments accelerate the elimination of ACA taxes. Despite these amendments a number of Republicans continued to publicly oppose the bill, leading to questions about the ability to pass the legislation.

Following the release of amendments, Republican leadership began to move through several procedural hurdles required to have a final vote on the legislation. Simultaneously, negotiations continued between the various parts of the Republican party on additional amendments that could secure enough votes to secure passage. The bill was originally scheduled to be considered by the full House yesterday; however, the vote was delayed following several reports indicating that the measure would fail on the floor. Later in the evening, President Trump announced that the vote would occur on Friday, March 24th, and failure to

pass the bill would result in the ACA remaining in place. As a final concession to some of the holdout Representatives, an additional amendment was offered that would increase funding for mental health services; allow the state stability fund to address prenatal and maternity care; delay the implementation of one ACA tax repeal; and eliminate the ACA Essential Health Benefits requirement by instead delegating the establishment of mandatory benefits to states.

Also occurring on Thursday afternoon, the Congressional Budget Office released an updated analysis of the impact of the AHCA, incorporating the amendments offered on Monday. The analysis determined that Monday's amendments would not alter the bill's impact on health insurance coverage, thus projecting that the bill will result in 24 million people losing coverage by 2026. In the analysis, CBO estimated that the primary impact of the amendments would be to reduce the savings that the bill generates. Originally, the legislation was expected to reduce the federal debt by \$337 billion over a ten year period. CBO projects that the amendments will reduce that figure to \$150 billion, largely due to the decreased federal revenue from the acceleration of repealing ACA taxes. The Thursday evening amendment was not included in the CBO score.

This morning, the House Rules Committee cleared the measure, allowing it to be considered on the floor. President Trump's ultimatum and the Rules Committee clearance now sets up a significant vote with an uncertain outcome in the House later today. Every Democrat is expected to oppose the legislation, meaning that leadership cannot lose more than 22 Republican votes or else the measure will fail.

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

A Healthy Smile Never Gets Old: A California Report on the Oral Health of Older Adults

This report from the Center for Oral Health highlights how an alarming number of Californians age 65 years and older are suffering from untreated tooth decay and poor oral health. This study found that half the older adults residing in skilled nursing homes have untreated tooth decay, and more than one in three community-dwelling older adults suffer from untreated tooth decay. Tooth decay not only impacts nutrition, but also causes social and emotional setbacks such as the inability to speak, and altered appearance, which can result in social isolation and shame. This report includes a series of recommendations to eliminate barriers to care and improve oral health.

Manufactured Crisis: How Devastating Drug Price Increases Are Harming America's Seniors

The Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee has released a report, detailing U.S. Senator Claire McCaskill's years-long effort to investigate dramatic prescription drug price increases. From 2012 to 2017, the prices of many of the most popular brand-name drugs increased at nearly ten times the cost of inflation. The report looked at the top 20 most commonly prescribed brand-name drugs for older adults. Furthermore, the report finds that although 48 million fewer prescriptions were written for the top 20 most commonly prescribed brand-name drugs for older adults, total sales revenue resulting from these prescriptions increased by almost \$8.5 billion during the same period.

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

Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services

Proposed Rules Regarding Payment

On **April 27, 2017**, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released three proposed rules regarding payment rates for a number of different providers, including rehabilitation hospitals, nursing facilities, and hospices. Skilled nursing facilities would receive a \$390 million increased in 2018, or approximately 1 percent greater than this year. Hospices would also receive a 1 percent increase or \$180 million. Finally, rehabilitation hospitals, if the proposed rule is approved, would receive an additional \$80 million in 2018. Comments for all three proposed rules are due to CMS by **June 26, 2017**.



Webinar: State Medicaid-Housing Agency Partnerships Technical Support Opportunity for States

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' (CMS) Medicaid



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Innovation Accelerator Program (IAP) is launching a new technical support opportunity for state Medicaid agencies to develop partnerships between state Medicaid agencies and their local housing systems to foster additional community living opportunities for Medicaid beneficiaries that require Long-Term Services and Support (LTSS). IAP will select up to eight states to participate in this 9-month opportunity.

The State Medicaid-Housing Agency Partnerships Track is designed to offer intensive and hands-on technical support to move selected states towards building sustained collaborations with housing partners and with partners from other service agencies. Consistent with statute, CMS does not provide Federal Financial Participation for room and board in home and community-based services, but can assist states with coverage of certain housing-related activities and services. This opportunity is available to all states except the eight that participated in this track in 2016: California, Connecticut, Hawaii, Illinois, Kentucky, Nevada, New Jersey, and Oregon.

From Congress

Congress Passes FY2017 Appropriations Bill

This week, the House and Senate passed an appropriations bill that will fund the Federal government through the end of Fiscal Year 2017 and avert a potential government shutdown. FY2017 runs through **September 30**, **2017**. The legislation deals with discretionary programs, not mandatory spending, and therefore does not impact programs such as Medicare, Medicaid, or Social Security.

The appropriations bill set funding levels for a number of services that are important to aging and disability services. Several programs within the Administration for Community Living (ACL) received funding increases, including:

- Senior Nutrition. Over the past several years, nutrition has received some substantial increases. This appropriations bill includes modest increases for both congregate (\$2 million increase) and home delivered meals (\$1 million increase);
- · HCBS Supportive Services. This program was funded at

- \$350 million, which is a \$2.5 million increase from FY2016 levels;
- Elder Rights and Adult Protective Services. Congress has again provided funding increases for these activities, increasing the appropriations by \$2 million to a total of \$13.87 million; and
- Supports for Aging Services to Native Americans.

The National Institutes of Health also received substantial funding increases for research and support on Alzheimer's disease and related dementia. The appropriations bill provides nearly \$1.4 billion, a \$400 million increase, which includes funding for dementia care and services research along with biomedical research.

Unfortunately, the legislation also includes several notable and substantial reductions to programs under ACL and the Older Americans Act. This includes programs previously targeted for cuts, at the following amounts:

- \$34 million reduction to SCSEP from a total of \$434 million to \$400 million, representing a nearly 8% cut to the program;
- \$5 million of reduced funding for SHIP to \$47 million, which is a 9.6% reduction.

The legislation also proposes several cuts to TA centers, such as the limb loss resource center (-\$300,000) and the paralysis resource center (-\$1 million).

House of Representatives

House Passes ACA Repeal Legislation

On **Thursday**, **May 4th**, the House of Representatives passed the American Health Care Act (AHCA). The ACHA is the bill that would repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The final vote was 217-213, with every Democrat and 20 Republicans voting against the measure. The legislation now goes to the Senate, where it is unlikely to pass in its current form. A number of Republican Senators have expressed concern about different provisions in the bill and have stated that the Senate will be drafting their own version of ACA repeal. The Senate will also likely need to make a number of changes to ensure that the bill meets the budget rules necessary to pass with a 51-vote majority. Due to the changes that are likely to occur, the Senate is not expected to move quickly on passing its own measure.

As passed, the AHCA makes a number of changes to the ACA, including repealing a wide range of insurance regulations, mandates, and taxes. The bill also includes policies that amount

to a significant restructuring of the Medicaid program. Most notably, the legislation would place a cap on state Medicaid expenditures per beneficiary, a stark departure from the current open ended funding formula.

There is variation in state Medicaid ACO measurement approaches related to access, quality, clinical, and cost goals. Therefore, states interested in using an accountable care organization (ACO) model for Medicaid populations must think critically about which metrics are best-suited to promote enhanced access and care coordination, as well as encourage provider accountability for these outcomes. There is a range of quality measure requirements for ACOs including simple collection and reporting, to advanced expectations involving

achievement thresholds, benchmark comparisons, and rates of improvement over time.

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

NASUAD and NASDDDS Release Report on MLTSS

On May 11, 2018, NASUAD released a report titled MLTSS for People for Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities: Strategies for Success. This report was co-authored by the National Association of State Directors of Developmental Disabilities Services (NASDDDS), in collaboration with Ari Ne'eman of Mysupport.com. This is the second in a series of publications from the MLTSS Institute, which was established in 2016 to drive improvements in key MLTSS policy areas, facilitate sharing and learning among states, and provide direct and intensive technical assistance to states and health plans.

Because there are unique challenges in implementing a managed long-term services and supports (MLTSS) program for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD), the report provides context on the intersection of program design and participant advocacy and outlines successful strategies for both states and health plans.

Promising practices from the few MLTSS programs delivering I/DD services are highlighted throughout.

NASUAD hopes that this report will stimulate thoughtful policy development and program design and promote high performing state systems that provide care for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

The State of Senior Hunger in America in 2016

This new report published by the National Foundation to End Senior Hunger (NFESH) and Feeding America analyzes data on food insecurity among older adults ages 60 and over. This data, pulled from the most recent year available, **2016**, illustrates that while the food-insecurity rate for this population has recently declined, it is still significantly higher than rates from the Great Recession a decade ago.

Many food insecure older adults have incomes which exclude them from federal assistance programs like the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP). This highlights a key gap in the coverage of services for this population. The report also highlights specific sub-segments of this population who are at particularly high risk of experiencing food insecurity, including older adults with disabilities and older adults who are racial or ethnic minorities.

New Publications on Fall Death Rates and how to Calculate Medical Costs

The injury and death rate from falls in older adults has been increasing over the last ten years. Falls in older adults are also extremely costly, totaling over \$50 billion each year in expenses. Many of these falls are preventable. However, if more efforts are not taken to reduce fall risks, America's aging population will result in a continued increase in fall injuries, deaths, and related costs over the coming years. CDC originally published a paper on this issue in March 2018, called "The Medical Costs of Fatal and Nonfatal Falls in Older Adults". They have now published two additional complementary publications delving further into the topic of falls in older adults.

The first publication, "Deaths from Falls Among Persons Aged =65 Years - United States, 2007-2016", appears in CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR). This report expands upon the previously reported statistic that falls are the leading cause of injury-related deaths among people 65 years and over. It highlights the increasing rate of deaths from falls, noting that fall-related deaths increased 31% from 2007 to 2016. This report emphasizes the growing scope of the problem and the need for providers to take actionable steps towards preventing and reducing falls, including through targeted interventions such as prescribing balance exercises.

The second publication, "Estimating the Economic Burden Related to Older Adult Falls by State," is published in the Journal of Public Health Management and Practice (JPHMP). It looks at methods of calculating the costs associated with falls in older adults and presents two methods to calculate these costs: partial attributable fraction, which focuses on the details of payer type, and count applied to cost, which utilizes states' own counts to assess lifetime costs. The goal of this report is to encourage states to use effective cost calculation to plan more targeted preventive measures going forward.

Guidance on the Electronic Visit Verification Requirements

On Wednesday May 16, 2018, CMS released the long-awaited guidance on the Electronic Visit Verification requirements in the 21st Century CURES Act. The guidance includes two documents: an Informational Bulletin and Frequently Asked Questions. The Informational Bulletin shares EVV implementation strategies and identifies promising practices for EVV education and training. The FAQs provide responses to an array of critical questions received from states since the passage of the Cures Act, including clarification on the specific types of personal care and home health services that must utilize EVV systems.

Notably, the FAQs clarify that residential settings providing 24 hour service availability, such as Assisted Living, are NOT included in the CURES Act EVV requirements.

CMS has announced that the online Medicare Learning Management System (LMS), part of the National Training Program (NTP), is now live. This resource is free to use and provides access to self-paced online training, webinars, and train-the-trainer workshops. CMS has currently released the first module in their curriculum, an introductory two-part course on the basics of understanding Medicare. Future courses will be published as they are developed, but the initial focus will be on enrollment-oriented lessons. National Senior Fraud Awareness Day

U.S. Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Bob Casey (D-PA), the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Senate Aging Committee, authored a bi-partisan resolution to officially recognize **May 15**, **2018** as National Senior Fraud Awareness Day. The senate unanimously passed this resolution on **May 10**, **2018**. This resolution's ultimate purpose is to "raise awareness about the increasing number of fraudulent schemes targeted at older people of the United States, to encourage the implementation of policies to prevent these scams from happening, and to improve protections from these scams for seniors".

Using Telehealth to Improve Home-Based Care for Older Adults and Family Caregivers

Telehealth is a potentially highly useful piece of the communitybased care puzzle. The use of telephones, email, and video to deliver health care may greatly improve quality and access to care for older adults. However, the use of telehealth is still expanding and is currently limited by various regulatory barriers. As a result, there is a dearth of conclusive information about the relationship telehealth has with access, cost, and quality.

This paper from AARP's Public Policy Institute discusses the potential implications of the expanded use of telehealth from the lens of older adults and family caregivers. It discusses the hope that telehealth may help address rising healthcare costs, enable older adults to stay in their homes longer, and relieve pressure for family caregivers. The paper states that research efforts must continue as telehealth expands in order to gain a better understanding of its effects on care.

The report emphasizes that the focus of telehealth expansion must remain on how this tool specifically impacts the experiences of older adults and their families. AARP recommends keeping the needs of this population at the center of these efforts. Finally, this report also highlights the importance of prioritizing the highest-risk populations and tailoring the application of telehealth to the most vulnerable populations, including those with limited technology access, so as not to unwittingly expand disparities in health care.

Attached, please find our analysis of the President's proposed budget for FY2019. This document outlines the proposal's impact on health and human services relevant to older adults, people with disabilities, and Medicaid long-term services and supports. This e-mail also includes our updated budget chart document that compares the various proposed and enacted funding levels for these important programs. In general, the budget proposal continues to highlight the Administration's priorities of increased investment in military and border protections coupled with reduced federal expenditures on health and human services programs. While the proposals will likely receive a lot of media attention and create significant headlines, Presidential budgets are nonbinding recommendations and have not historically been enacted into law. However, it is also important to be aware of some of the proposals and policies contained within, as they may arise during future spending debates, regulatory proposals, and other policymaking avenues.



Good Morning NASUAD Members:

We wanted to make sure you were aware of <u>two critical pieces of information that CMS released</u> <u>this morning on Medicaid.gov</u>.

- 1. An informational bulletin addressing the findings of the OIG/OCR/ACL Joint Report on state oversight of group homes that was issued in January. In the CIB, CMS urges states to review the recommendations included in the report and incorporate them into their critical incident management and quality assurance processes. We've attached both the CIB and the Joint Report for ease of reference.
- 2. Instructions and the necessary content that a state should include in its application for the 'good-faith' exemption for a 1-year delay in the EVV compliance deadline for personal care services that goes into effect on January 1, 2019. Only one request may be filed by a state between July 1 November 30, 2018. We have attached the instructions here as well.

Additionally, CMS will be holding **two webinars (July 11 and July 18th)** on HCBS issues. We encourage you to register early and attend!



Today, NASUAD is pleased to announce the release of a new report, <u>MLTSS for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities: Strategies for Success</u>, co-authored by the **National Association of State Directors of Developmental Disabilities Services (NASDDDS),** in collaboration with Ari Ne'eman of Mysupport.com. The report is the second in a series of publications from the MLTSS Institute, which was established in 2016 to drive improvements in key MLTSS policy areas, facilitate sharing and learning among states, and provide direct and intensive technical assistance to states and health plans.

Because there are unique challenges in implementing a managed long-term services and supports (MLTSS) program for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD), the report provides context on the intersection of program design and participant advocacy and outlines successful strategies for both states and health plans. Promising practices from the few MLTSS programs delivering I/DD services are highlighted throughout.

States and plans should address these elements in any I/DD-focused MLTSS program:

- Clear goals and data-based design;
- Ongoing and rigorous stakeholder engagement focusing on participants and their families;
- Strong collaboration among state agencies;

- Contract terms and payment arrangements that support program goals.





Hello, DAIL Advisory Board Members:

Following up on some of our recent meetings and discussions about future agenda items, we have a very full agenda planned for September. I appreciate the willingness of so many of you who are willing to stay a bit late this month so that we can fit everything in that we need to this month. Below are some brief descriptions for some of our agenda items:





4. State Long Term Care Ombudsman: Many of you will remember that each year the State Long Term Care Ombudsman submits an annual report to the legislature and as part of that report, is required to submit an assessment of the programs ability to operate free from conflict of interest as an appendix to that report. Over the past year, the Vermont Ombudsman Project and DAIL have been working collaboratively to implement new Federal Regulations for ombudsman programs, including conflict of interest. Per state statute, the DAIL Commissioner is required to establish a committee who represent the interests of individuals receiving long-term care for the purpose of ensuring that the Ombudsman program is free from conflicts of interests. Congratulations, DAIL Advisory Board, that committee is YOU! Last year, a small subcommittee of the Advisory Board worked with the State Ombudsman to review conflict of interest in detail, particularly in light of the new Federal Regulations and the need to revise the Ombudsman program policies to come into compliance. At that time, because the work was still on-going related to implementing the regulations and revising the policies, the board requested that a similar subcommittee be formed this year to last year's be convened to work with the State Long Term Care Ombudsman again and then report back to the full Advisory Board. So, State Long Term Care Ombudsman Sean Londergan will be talking a bit more about the program, this charge and requesting volunteers to be part of the subcommittee. Angela Smith-Dieng has been the DAIL lead working with the Ombudsman Program most recently so she will be joining as a resource. So, please be thinking about your interest and ability to serve on this subcommittee.

Indiana just revised our Monitoring Checklist for case management, and engaged in a notable overhaul of our person centered service plan format. These efforts were driven by a desire to shift the focus of case managers from the monitoring tools, to individuals' person-centered plans. Our monitoring checklist had gotten so large and intensive, most of the case management service was being driven around getting the items on the checklist addressed, and the person-centered plan focus wasn't what we wanted to see. Hi – I hope I'm not too late, I offered one minor edit – I thought it might be worth emphasizing that it would allow people with TBI to be better served when they transition to CFC than currently occurs as they would receive more appropriate and effective services – I'm not sure if I really got the point through, but you can do with it what you want.

Megan, one thing that I did not when I was discussing this with Monica was just a reminder that the TBI program is operated very loosely right now. If you look at the eligibility criteria for TBI, it really is quite broad. And, there are no regulations, just the manual (I'm not sure if it is even called a policy at this point). So, raising this proposal may raise issues with the TBI program and in any case, at some point, as I'm sure you are already aware, it is important that we look at tightening up/cleaning up some things with the way we operate the TBI program. Perhaps that's already in the works with Sara now on board, but I just thought I would mention it.

Then, the only other question that I had was how we would see case management happening for these folks with TBI served through CFC – would they receive case management through the TBI provider, or still choose between AAA or HHA? If we are opening case management to TBI providers, does this raise any issues with the existing CFC case management providers, or other CFC providers who over time have advocated that they should also be able to provide and bill for CM, and/or any could this cause any issues/complications with the CMS HCBS rules which I know are still a bit up in the air? I thought of this case management issue after I met with Monica.

Note that Tennessee has implemented the Employment Community First Choices Waiver (ECF) and the HCBS Waivers are closed to new enrollments.

Thanks for following up on this Tom! The answer to your question is Yes...HHAs/AAAS are the only qualified entities to provide both direct care and case management services statewide. HHAs are designated in Vermont state statute and AAAs are designated by the State and were—are established and are supported by in accordance with the Older Americans Act. When providing case management, both entities must follow the same Case Management Standards and Certification Procedures for Older Americans Act and Choices for Care. This unique arrangement results in the only willing and qualified entity to perform assessments of functional need and develop person-centered service plans also providing HCBS.

If we are only responding to: "HHAs/AAAs are the only qualified entities to provide both direct care and case management services" and "Specifically, does VT believe that to be the case statewide or only in certain geographic entities?" I would say "Yes, we believe this to be the case statewide." AND, I agree with Suzanne's comment that AAA's and HHA's manage services within a set geographic region (one HHA entity has a statewide territory but does NOT provide case management). Though anecdotally, the AAA's tend to provide more "social services" and HHA provide more "medical services" they both must follow the same Case Management Certification Standards. So I wouldn't recommend including that statement to CMS.

Yes we provided support to DAIL and AHS (Selina) in drafting the summary that went to CMS last year.

At the time we were looking at the VT statute which designates HHA's for each region. The AAA's did not have VT statutory designation, but received federal Older American Act (non-Medicaid) funds for

the general population through the OAA state plan. While providers are based on consumer choice, DAIL suggested that the HHA's tend to serve a distinct CFC population i.e., those who are more medically complex, while AAA's served persons with more social service needs.

Given the suggestion that the current administration is looking to support more "state based flexibility" it is unclear how CMS might interpret the Vermont system.



In Tennessee the maximum caseload size is 35, for Support Coordinators working with people supported in the Self Determination Waiver. This caseload ratio is consistent with the State's licensure rules for Support Coordination agencies. The caseload does not include a mix of eligibility types, e.g., alternate waiver programs or funding sources. The current requirement for face-to-face contacts is one time per calendar month. The Support Coordinator may increase the frequency of contacts based on the needs of the person supported.

Hi Camille and Clare.

The webinar yesterday was very interesting. Some of the noted requirements below may fall under special terms and conditions, but I thought it was important to note them so they can be verified... the presenter did not refer to these as requirements which could be waived in STC, and he presented them as non-negotiable federal law, especially the care plan.

Slide 15: Level of care is used in reference to clinical eligibility determinations (we separate the terminology...level of care in VT refers to the level of service needed(resource scale), clinical *eligibility is a different process)*

Slide 16: Per federal law, assessments must be done at least annually to ensure the person still is eligible for services (meets level of care). (We do not require needs assessments be done annually, nor do we require eligibility/level of care be assessed at least annually)

Slide 18: Service plans MUST be developed prior to delivery of services –federal funding is not available for services delivered outside of the service plan Plans must include all supports provided to meet the assessed needs of the individual, including state-plan and non-Medicaid supports (this appears to be in conflict with ISA quidelines and periodic review, I raised this question to Chris several months ago, he confirmed that QM vetted the policy when they developed the ISA guidelines but they may want to review/revisit and possibly make changes to their policy on ISA's)

Slide 19: Since services plans are tied to assessed needs, a new plan requires some type of **updated assessment (**Not sure QM if requires new needs assessments with ISA annual reviews/changes)

Slide 39: Under federal rules, services in waivers cannot begin until the plan of care is completed. (reiteration of the bullet above from slide 18. QM may want to research this).

Slide 43: Assessment types: Supports Intensity Scale (SIS) and Inventory for Client and Agency Planning (ICAP).

Commonly used for people with intellectual/development disabilities. At least 28 states are using one of these, they can be modified with additional questions to tailor the **assessment to Vermont (**reflect our funding priorities, ask about other environments, natural supports etc.)

Slide 45: benefits of implementing an off-the-shelf uniform assessment tool: can be

modified, there is no additional charge for aggregated data. Training manuals and algorithms for resource utilization groups, quality measures and resource scales have already been developed. (*less resource intensive*)

Slide 44: State will have to ensure the validity (the degree to which the tool measures what it aims to measure) and reliability (the degree to which the tool's results are consistent) of homegrown tools, which can be complicated and resource-intensive. (If DDSD decided to develop our own (home grown) tool instead of using an existing uniform assessment tool, these would be paramount considerations).

- 1. An informational bulletin addressing the findings of the OIG/OCR/ACL Joint Report on state oversight of group homes that was issued in January. In the CIB, CMS urges states to review the recommendations included in the report and incorporate them into their critical incident management and quality assurance processes. We've attached both the CIB and the Joint Report for ease of reference.

When New Hampshire negotiated their waiver renewal, CMS identified where they were out of line with federal law in two areas: conflict-free case management and the arrangement of forcing providers to seek Medicaid payments through a fixed network. Historically the Designated Agencies in NH have been funded at a level where they can hire and sustain personnel that do service coordination exclusively. Each agency has a case management department. Program management is paid for and has its own personnel infrastructure. They exist as separate departments within the DAs. Even with this separation, CMS stated that this was not sufficient to avoid conflict. NH submitted a Corrective Action Plan (CAP).

I would say that it is just a matter of time before CMS requires this of Vermont.

The following is an excerpt regarding environmental accessibility adaptations from Florida's Developmental Disabilities Individual Budgeting Waiver Services Coverage and Limitations Handbook:

Environmental Accessibility Adaptations

Description

Environmental accessibility adaptations (EAA) are those physical adaptations to the home that are required by the recipient's support plan and are medically necessary to avoid institutional placement of the recipient and enable the

recipient to function with greater independence in the home.

Home accessibility assessments can also include pre-inspection of up to three houses a recipient or family is considering for purchase, review of ceiling lift and track systems, van conversions, and oversight and final inspection of any approved EAA.

Who Can Provide

If the construction is not completed by the independent assessor, the assessor can still provide construction oversight and a final inspection. Providers of EAA services include licensed general or independent licensed contractors, electricians, plumbers, carpenters, architects, and engineers. Other professionals who can provide EAA assessments include providers with experience in the field of environmental accessibility adaptation assessment, with a RESNA certification, and an occupational license.

Service Requirements

Environmental accessibility adaptation services are limited to the amount, duration, and scope of the adaptation project described on the recipient's support plan and current approved cost plan.

To submit a request, the appropriate professional must complete an assessment documenting how the specific EAA is medically necessary and is a critical health and safety need, how it is directly related to the recipient's developmental disability, how it is directly related to accessibility issues within the home, and how, without the identified EAA, the recipient cannot continue to reside in the recipient's current residence.

The request will be reviewed by the APD regional office to determine whether the standards for medical necessity are met and to determine whether the requested item fairly meets the service definition.

Adaptations specifically excluded in this handbook will not be approved. Environmental accessibility adaptations include only adaptations to an existing structure, and must be provided in accordance with applicable state or local building codes. Adaptations that add to the total square footage of the home are excluded from this benefit. No more than five units per day will be provided and billed and a total limit of \$20,000.00 cannot be exceeded over a five-year period.

Service Requirements, continued

This determination includes all of the following considerations:

- There are no less costly or conservative means to meet the recipient's need for accessibility within the home.
- The environmental accessibility adaptation is individualized, specific, and consistent with the recipient's needs and not in excess of those needs.
- The environmental accessibility adaptation enables the recipient to function with greater independence in the home and, without it, the recipient would require institutionalization.

Once adaptations are made to a recipient's residence, adaptation to that residence or another residence cannot be made until five years after the last adaptation to the first residence except for extenuating circumstances, such as total loss of the residence. The cost of adaptation must not exceed the value of the residence.

The waiver program does not cover routine repairs to the existing EAA or general repairs to the home or residence.

Environmental accessibility adaptations must be separated into two categories.

Minor adaptations must be defined as those EAA costing under \$3,500 for all adaptations in the home. Major adaptations must include those adaptations to a home when the total cost is \$3,500 and over. Total EAA cannot exceed \$20,000 during a five-year period. Major environmental accessibility adaptations require the assessment of a rehabilitation engineer or other professional qualified to make a home accessibility assessment. This home accessibility assessment must include evaluation of the current home and

Place of Service

describe the most cost-beneficial manner to permit accessibility of the home for the recipient on the waiver.

Environmental accessibility adaptations must be made only to a recipient's family home or recipient's own home, including rented houses or apartments. Recipients living in foster homes, group homes, assisted living facilities, or homes for special services (any licensed residential facility) are not eligible to receive this service. The responsibility for EAA rests with the facility owner or operator.

Limitations and Exclusions

A recipient's rental property is limited to minor adaptations. Prior to any adaptation to a rental property, a determination should be made as to what, if anything, the landlord will cover. The landlord, prior to service, must approve all proposed environmental accessibility adaptations in writing. The written agreement between the recipient, the recipient's family, or the recipient's legal representative, and the landlord, must specify any requirements for restoration of the property to its original condition if the recipient moves, and must indicate that APD and waiver funding are not obligated for any restoration costs. Waiver funds cannot be placed in escrow to undo any accessibility adaptations when the recipient moves out. Recipients or families requesting EAA are expected to apply for all other assistance that can be available to assist in meeting the recipient's needs. This includes local housing authorities, county, local, and community funding. Environmental accessibility adaptations that are required to support proper functioning of medical equipment, such as electrical upgrades, are limited to the requirements for the safe operation of the specified equipment. If a recipient, family, or legal representative builds a home while the recipient is receiving waiver services, major or structural changes will not be covered. Environmental accessibility adaptations covered under these circumstances are the difference in the cost, if any, between a handicapped-accessible bathroom and a standard bathroom. However, the cost difference for each item and adaptation must be documented, with total cost not exceeding \$3,500.

The evaluation must demonstrate that the environmental accessibility adaptation recommended is a "prudent purchase." Each EAA must be the most reasonable alternative based on the results of the review of all options, including a change in the use of rooms within the home or alternative housing. Adaptations or improvements to the home, which are of general utility and are not of direct medical or remedial benefit to the recipient, are excluded. Examples of items not covered include replacement of carpeting and other floor coverings unless removed to achieve the installation of the adaptation; roof repair; driveways; decks; patios; fences; swimming pools; spas or hot tubs; sheds; sidewalks (unless this is the person's only means of access into the home); central heating and air conditioning; raised garage doors; storage such as cabinets, shelving, or closets; standard home fixtures such as sinks, commodes, tubs, stoves, refrigerators, microwaves, dishwashers, clothes washers and dryers, wall, window and door coverings, furniture, appliances, bedding; and other non-custom items that can routinely be found in a home. Also, specifically excluded are any adaptations that will add square footage to the home.

Reimbursement

Once the most reasonable alternative has been identified and specifications have been developed, three competitive bids must be obtained for all EAA to a home costing \$3,500 and over to determine the most economical option. If three bids cannot be obtained, the WSC must document in the support coordination notes what efforts were made to secure the three bids and explain why fewer than three were obtained.

For EAA costing between \$1,000 and \$3,499, at least two competitive bids must be obtained. If two bids cannot be obtained, it must be documented in

the support coordination notes to show what efforts were made to secure the two bids and explain why only one was obtained.

For EAA costing under \$1,000, only one bid is required, as long as it can be demonstrated in the bid that the bid is consistent with local market value for like environmental adaptations.

Environmental accessibility adaptations do not include those adaptations or improvements to the home that are of general utility, are considered to be standard housing obligations of the owner or tenant, are considered to be experimental, or are not of direct medical or remedial benefit to the recipient on the waiver. Routine maintenance of the adaptations and general repair and maintenance to the home is the responsibility of the owner or landlord, and not a covered waiver service.

This question has many parameters, here are a few of our

In Virginia:

• The Dept. of Medical Assistance Services in Virginia as the payor, would address issues in their COOP, re: continuing M'caid benefits. Virginia Dept. of Social Services (DSS) handles the eligibility pieces.

Here is what the DMAS state agency has shared at this point in time:

o CHIP State Plan Amendment – DMAS received CMS approval for an amendment to our State Medicaid Plan that allows for presumptive renewal of children and their families whose Medicaid eligibility was set to expire within 90 days following a State or Federal declared disaster. This ensures that CHIP Medicaid recipients continue to receive uninterrupted coverage while they tend to their immediate recovery needs.

o DME Replacement – DMAS has updated their Provider Manual to allow Medicaid recipients to replace any durable medical equipment or supplies that was damaged or destroyed during a disaster, even if it's still during the useful life period (for example – wheelchairs that were damaged can be replaced even if it's before the normal 5-year useful life replacement period).

In addition:

- If a person is displaced from their home (i.e. home demolished d/t hazard and no longer has a mailing address) and the agency is not operational, then the person would go to the local Disaster Resource Center (local, state or FEMA) and request "access and functional needs assistance" or advise they need assistance with continuity of benefits. Should a person need to renew eligibility and unable to d/t event, then they would be connected with the Dept. of Social Services (DSS) in Virginia.
- There are also provisions under certain programs where the State Agency, can ensure continuity if the person is transferred from one program to another; or one facility to another d/t the event (i.e. from waiver home setting to a nursing or acute medical facility) for a federal disaster declaration.
- Virginia, coordinated through the Va. Dept of Emer. Management (VDEM) and with multiple external state agencies and partners, has ongoing planning reviews for Access and Functional Needs, Mass Care related issues; in addition to the various agencies COOPs which are part of the larger Commonwealth of Virginia Emergency planning (COVEP).

#### C. Excerpts about Vermont experience included in the New Hampshire proposal:

Between 2007 and 2015, as the **independent evaluator for the Choices for Care 1115 waiver**, UMass produced yearly policy briefs and evaluation reports that 1) summarized major changes in CFC policies or procedures; 2) described initiatives or efforts CFC had undertaken, and 3) explained program outcomes such as impacts on participants and the LTSS system. Policy briefs included topics such as personal and systemic factors leading to nursing facility readmissions, flexibility for the CFC Moderate Needs Group, Alzheimer's disease, non-medical providers, self-direction, and other issues. Marybeth McCaffrey was a member of the team in 2003-2005 that developed Vermont's 1115 waiver for people with physical disabilities and who are over age 65. She also supported the waiver's renewal in 2010 and consolidation in early 2014. Choices for Care was revolutionary in its approach because it eliminated Medicaid's institutional bias and extended to people the entitlement to long term services and supports in their choice of setting. The program also supports people below the institutional level of care. Today, Vermont has successfully balanced this system, consolidated it with the rest of the Medicaid program as part of the Global Commitment to Health waiver, and stretched limited state resources to meet the significant needs of more people.

You have the major communications sent to CMS. I've attached two emails and another document that could be helpful:

- Re: Vermont Choices for Care Program Summary and Proposed Panning to Strengthen Conflict of Interest Protections: this email shows multiple attempts to gain response from CMS on the CFC conflict of interest exception request. It also highlights what we and they understand; the exception criteria is not a perfect fit for Vermont's situation, as there is more than one available case management agency.
- Re: Follow up question on CFC HHA/AAAs: this email shows CMS confirmation that our follow up response was received.
- Conflict Free Case Management\_DA\_DMH(03): this document was sent to CMS on 9/22/17 and seeks the conflict free case management exception for mental health programs and services provided through Designated Agencies. This brief is able to show clearly that there is only one willing and qualified case manager for Mental Health HCBS services. No response has been received to this brief.

Finally, CMS indicated to the State of Vermont in conversations that any exception to the conflict free case management requirements described in federal regulations must be enacted through an amendment to our 1115 waiver. At the time, we decided the next opportunity to ask for the exception would be through the SUD amendment process, however, I do not believe that loose end was tied off prior to the SUD amendment approval.

CIB: Extension of Transition Period for Compliance with Home and Community-Based Settings Criteria

Business Acumen Resource Center Launches First Chapter of Toolkit

The Business Acumen Resource Center and its partners released the first chapter of the Business Acumen tool kit. The toolkit is being developed to prepare community-based organizations (CBOs) to contract with integrated health care entities and provide tools and resources to help expand the ways CBOs do business. The toolkit is being released chapter by chapter.

Ohio Requests 5-year 1115 Medicaid Demonstration Requiring Work or Community Engagement

The Ohio Department of Medicaid, which includes the Division of Developmental Disabilities, has requested a new 5-year section 1115 demonstration to CMS, which seeks to modify the existing Medicaid expansion program to require beneficiaries in the new adult group to participate in work or community engagement as a requirement for continued Medicaid eligibility.

According to the application, to comply with the requirement, beneficiaries will need to demonstrate they work at least 20 hours a week or are engaged in other allowable activities. Failure to also meet the requirements will result in termination of Medicaid benefits.

Kentucky Initiates Employment First Executive Order

According to a recent news release, this month Kentucky Governor Matt Bevin signed Executive Order 2018-328 to add Kentucky to the growing list of states with Employment First policies for people with disabilities. The news release states "the Employment First Executive Order will ensure that competitive and integrated employment in the community shall be considered the first and primary option for persons with disabilities who want to become employed. This means that all state agencies will work toward making sure people with disabilities have opportunities to work in the community and offer valuable skills to their employers while receiving a competitive wage."

The order also creates the Employment First Council as an advisory body of state government to pursue the purposes of the executive order. The executive order was one of the recommendations of the Kentucky Work Matters Task Force, which was a 23-member task force was established last summer to identify barriers and actions for people with disabilities, foster children, veterans with disabilities and those impacted by substance abuse or criminal records.

Colorado Implements Employment First Recommendations

Colorado has initiated SB18-145 "Implement Employment First Recommendations" which a bill is concerning the implementation of the employment first advisory partnership recommendations to advance competitive integrated employment for persons with disabilities.

The bill requires the department of labor and employment and the state medical services board in the department of health care policy and financing to promulgate rules that require all providers of supported employment services for persons with disabilities to obtain a nationally recognized supported employment training certificate or earn a nationally recognized supported employment certification relating to supported employment services.

The rules must specify the time frames for completion of the training or certification and provide for training to be completed over a 5-year period, subject to appropriations for reimbursement of vendors. The state medical services board shall adopt rules for administering the reimbursements to vendors, which must be \$300 for each certification exam and \$1,200 for each training program certificate, which

includes reimbursement for both the cost of training and wages paid to employees during training.

The bill requires that the department of labor and employment's fee schedule for rehabilitation services include the discovery process as an alternative comprehensive assessment if appropriate for persons with disabilities. The bill also lists annual employment data, reported by county, that the department of health care policy and financing must collect.

Tennessee Becomes 14th State to Not Operate Any Large State Institutions

According to a recent news release, Tennessee has now become the 14th State to not operate any large, state insitutions as Greene Valley Developmental Center (GVDC) closed after more than 5 decades of operation. Tennessee now joins 13 other states and the District of Columbia that do not operate any large, state-run institutions for people with intellectual disabilities.

"People who lived at Greene Valley are now living rewarding lives in their communities," Department of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (DIDD) Commissioner Debra K. Payne said. "We are closing an important chapter in the history of supporting people with disabilities in Tennessee. It's important to celebrate the huge advancements we've made, while remembering the important role Greene Valley played for 56 years."

"I want to take this opportunity to thank all Greene Valley employees for the excellent care they have provided to people with disabilities for more than 50 years," Payne

said. "Also, the entire Greene County community has supported the facility and the people who live there, and we are extremely grateful for their continued partnership as we support people with intellectual disabilities in the community."

In 1995, Greene Valley, Clover Bottom and Nat. T Winston Developmental Centers were the subject of an investigation by the U.S. Department of Justice and a lawsuit was brought by advocates for people with disabilities over conditions at the three institutions. After two decades of work to improve the state's service delivery system, all parties agreed to an Exit Plan in January 2015, which included the closure of GVDC.

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Rhode Island Launches Person-Centered Supported Employment Program

Rhode Island's Department of Behavioral Healthcare, Developmental Disabilities & Hospitals Division of Developmental Disabilities, recently implemented a Person-Centered Supported Employment Performance Program. The goal of the program is to promote the expansion of integrated employment opportunities and supported employment services.

The Program's Performance-Based Contracts include performance payments that are linked to graduated levels of provider achievement regarding enhanced staff training and employment outcomes, based on standard implementation timelines.

The 22 participating provider agencies developed goals and benchmarks related to three core components of integrated employment services:

- 1) **Staff Credentials:** staff must be certified from an Association Community Rehabilitation Educators (ACRE) approved training or they must secure the Certified Employment Specialist Program (CESP) designation.
- 2) Employment Team Structure: Providers submitted an outline of their supported employment model, team structure and specific details about the number of individuals they propose to support.
- 3) **Provider Performance Goals:** Providers established specified performance measures, numerical targets, implementation timelines, and goals they expect to achieve while providing integrated employment services.

Monthly "Strategy Meetings" are held with participating provider agencies to review best practices, outline training needs, review program specific topics, and problem solve barriers to success. These strategy meetings also include the Rhode Island Office of Rehabilitation Services, for ongoing collaborative discussions, and often host a guest speaker to discuss topics pertinent to employment program needs. Additionally, technical assistance is provided on a regular basis to support the system transformation required to increase employment opportunities for individuals living with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities.

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Colorado Passes Bill Changing State Statute to Allow Additional Case Management Entities

The Colorado Office of Community Living shared through its spring update that SB17-1343 regarding implementing conflict free case management has passed through both chambers in the Colorado legislature. The bill implements conflict-free case management for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are enrolled in home- and community-based services under Colorado's Medicaid program.

The definition of conflict-free case management is included in the bill and reflects the policy that case management services are provided to a person with intellectual and developmental disabilities who is enrolled in home- and community-based services by an agency that is not also providing the same person services and supports unless a federal exemption is approved.

Gretchen Hammer, Director of the Office of Community Living shared in the update that rules and regulations will be promulgated and through the Medical Services Board in 12-18 months which will allow additional case management agencies to be certified to provide case management in Colorado. (This will allow more than one case management agency for increased choice, currently limited by state statute to just one of the 20 Community Centered Boards by catchment area).

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Lead Center Announces New ABLE Brief

The LEAD Center released a brief titled, "The ABLE Act and Employment: Strategies for Maximizing the Effectiveness of the Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) Act as a Tool for Financial Stability and Employment Outcomes of People with Disabilities."

The purpose of this brief is to demonstrate how provisions in the ABLE Act can be combined with federal benefit services and other federal programs and initiatives to further competitive integrated employment for people with disabilities. The brief contains a list of the provisions of the ABLE Act, their impact on the financial self-sufficiency and employment opportunities of persons with disabilities, and recommendations on how to best utilize the ABLE Act to maximize these outcomes. Some examples included in the brief of how an ABLE account can be combined with other supports, in order to increase financial self-sufficiency and/or employment opportunities, include:

- Utilizing the SSI PASS (Plan for Achieving Self-Support) program in conjunction with ABLE account savings to maintain supported employment services.
- Using the ABLE accounts to pay for Medicaid Buy-In Program premiums, rather than limiting their earned income to stay below Medicaid's income limits. That way, people continue to be eligible for their Medicaid-funded supported employment services while steadily improving their financial status.
- Having state VR programs consider providing assistance in linking people to support for setting up ABLE accounts, as something offered to VR participants.

Connecticut Prepares to Launch New e-Licensing Portal

Connecticut Department of Developmental Services (DDS) is launching a new e-Licensing portal, slated to rollout in late 2017 or early 2018. The new portal will support Community Living Arrangement (CLA) and Community Companion Home (CCH) licensing, Evacuation Score tracking, and Medication Administration Certification. The web-based application's many benefits include access bility from any internet connection, allowing role-based access for DDS personnel and private providers, automated workflows and notifications, document management and electronic signature capability. The e-Licensing application will support streamlined processes, reducing waiting times, paper handling and duplicative document submission, and increasing efficiency and timeliness in licensing and other supported functions.

The e-Licensing journey began two years ago when DDS was invited to participate in a statewide Lean process with multiple agencies to identify requirements for an electronic licensing application. The Lean project resulted in shared requirements across agencies to allow for an Enterprise solution – one modular and configurable software product that could be used by many agencies. Funding for the initial implementation was requested by the Department of Administrative Services Bureau of Enterprise Systems & Technology (DAS/BEST) on behalf of participating agencies, and was awarded through the IT Capitol Investment Program at the Office of Policy and Management (OPM). Currently six state agencies utilize the e-Licensing portal, including the Departments of Consumer Protection, Public Health, and Agriculture, the Office of Early Childhood, and the CT Agricultural Experiment Station (CAES) Department of Entomology.

DDS is confident that the technological advancements, in conjunction with improved processes and streamlined business rules, will result in reduced administrative burdens for our provider community and DDS staff. We are committed to ensuring that the rollout is done thoughtfully and intend to announce training opportunities for users later in the fall. As we transition from the old paper process to the new automated electronic process, we will be looking for feedback on how the new process is working so we can make adjustments as needed.

Tennessee Long-Standing Law Suit Dismissed

Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam and Department of Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (DIDD) Commissioner Debra K. Payne today announced the dismissal of the longstanding Clover Bottom lawsuit, effectively ending a quarter century of litigation and court oversight of intellectual disabilities services in the state of Tennessee.

U.S. District Chief Judge Waverly D. Crenshaw, Jr. dismissed the case and entered an order in which he found the state had complied with all conditions of a court approved plan to improve services and the quality of life for citizens with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Tennessee now has quality assurance and protection from harm programs that support people with intellectual disabilities. These programs have been recognized nationally as models of best practice for other states.

"We have fundamentally changed the way we serve some of our most vulnerable citizens in Tennessee," Haslam said. "I'm grateful for the tireless work of so many people to get to this point and ultimately improve the lives of thousands of Tennesseans with intellectual and developmental disabilities."

People First of Tennessee filed the lawsuit in 1995 and it was later consolidated with a case filed by the federal government concerning the conditions at three state developmental centers: Clover Bottom Developmental Center in Nashville; Greene Valley Developmental Center in Greeneville; and Nat T. Winston Developmental Center in Bolivar. The court partially dismissed the case in 2016. The closure of Greene Valley Developmental Center was the remaining item to be completed and occurred in May 2017. A separate lawsuit concerning Arlington Developmental Center was dismissed in 2013. All four developmental centers have now closed and thousands of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities now receive home and community based supports.

"By every measure possible, the transformation has been a remarkable success," said People First of Tennessee's attorney Judith Gran. "Tennessee has one of the best community services in the nation, providing services and support in a rich array of programs."

"The parties recognize that Tennessee is providing high quality supports in the community and no longer needs court oversight," Payne said. "The path to this day has not been an easy one, and could not have been accomplished without long hours, hard work, dedication and a deep passion for the people we support shown by the employees of DIDD."

The dismissal of this case was agreed to by all parties, including the plaintiffs who represented hundreds of Tennesseans with intellectual disabilities who at one time lived in one of the state institutions, as well as two parent guardian associations.

In January 2015, the parties agreed to a plan to exit the suit in which DIDD and TennCare agreed to complete nine sections of requirements, including:

Developing training for law enforcement officers who may come into contact with persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities:

Authoring training for licensed physicians, caregivers and families to improve outcomes of medical care for people with disabilities; Revising individual support plans;

Establishing behavioral respite homes in East and Middle Tennessee; and Closing Greene Valley Developmental Center.

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Oklahoma Initiates Practice and Policy Lecture Series Focusing on family members

Supporting family members with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) is the topic of the September Practice and Policy Lecture Series presented by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services (DHS). "Reframing Change at All Levels to Support Families across LifeCourse" will be held Tuesday, Sept. 26, 2017, from noon to 1 p.m. at the Oklahoma History Center, 800 Nazih Zuhdi Drive, Oklahoma City. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Oklahoma is one of 17 states participating in the National Community of Practice for Supporting Families which seeks to enhance policies and practices that impact families with members with intellectual and developmental disabilities. The work is guided by Charting the LifeCourse framework which was developed to help individuals and families at any age or stage of life think about what they need to know, identify how to find or develop integrated supports, and discover what it takes to create a "good life." The presentation will introduce the Charting the LifeCourse framework as a foundation for working with individuals with I/DD and their families, exploring the effect of past and current policies and practices, and the significant role families play across the lifespan. Real life examples of implementation of the framework will be shared.

Featured speaker is Ms. Crystal Bell, who is the mother of Peyton, a 13-year-old diagnosed with Down Syndrome; Conner, a 12-year-old diagnosed with autism; and Lilly, an energetic, "typically-developing" two-year-old. Bell was a volunteer at the Missouri Family-to-Family Information Center, housed at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Institute for Human Development before joining LifeCourse in 2013. She is a trained Sharing Our Strengths peer mentor and family leader within the Missouri Family-to-Family organization, as well as a 2016 graduate of the Missouri Developmental Disabilities Council's Partners in Policymaking Program, a leadership and advocacy training program for parents of children with developmental disabilities as well as adult self-advocates. Bell is a lifelong learner whose education and trainings span all life stages and domains, including Wrightslaw, Tools of Choice, and Care Coordination and Advocacy.

The Practice and Policy Lecture Series has been developed to provide thought-provoking presentations on Oklahoma's emerging policy issues, trends and best practices. The series is sponsored by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services Office of Planning, Research and Statistics and the University of Oklahoma Center for Public Management with the goal of providing the best educational opportunities available in a forum that offers participants an opportunity to question, share and learn from each other.

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Oregon Commissions Studies on LTSS

The Oregon Department of Human Services, Aging and people with Disabilities (APD) commissioned studies completed by Oregon Universities which review quality, availability, and more of long-term services and supports (LTSS).

Studies focused on community care settings and offered several observations:

- Oregon has the highest rate of Assisted Living and residential care communities that accept Medicaid in the nation.
- The demand for endorsed memory care facilities has increased during the past decade.
- The majority of community-based care settings employ a full-time RN though not required.
- More than 9 in 10 admissions to Oregon nursing facilities come from hospitals.


