Specimen Collection Support:

Home Health Agencies – Check with your local home health agencies if you have test kits be need support with specimen collection.

EMS Agencies – Facilities can work directly with local EMS agencies to assist with testing. VDH would not be involved. EMS may be interested in being used this way, but it is their choice to participate.

Considerations when completing non-diagnostic testing of staff or residents (such as baseline facility-wide testing or repeated staff testing)

- Testing is only one tool available to us for preventing and responding to COVID-19. It is important to recognize testing is only a point-in-time understanding of presence or absence of active infection.
- If an infection control assessment has not already been performed, include an evaluation of infection prevention and control practices before completing facility-wide testing. Testing should not supersede implementation of a strong infection prevention and control program.
- Facilities should have response plans in place prior to testing. This plan should help prepare the facility in then event of cases among staff or residents. Plans should include exclusion of positive staff, mitigation of staffing shortages and cohorting of residents and staff providing care.
