# Vendor list: Products for people with hearing and vision loss

This is to help Vermonters find vendors that supply assistive devices to people who are deafblind or have combined hearing and vision loss. ## **Devices**

Amplified phones with large buttons or photo speed dial options.

**Bluetooth streaming devices** stream sound from a phone or assistive listening device directly to a hearing aid or cochlear implant.

**Braille displays** connect to smartphones and display text in braille on the display device.

**Captioned telephones** with large text displays.

**Electronic reading machines or magnifiers** use a camera and display screen to enlarge text on print materials, such as letters, prescription bottles, books, etc.

**IP relay** uses a computer or tablet, internet connection, and webbased platform to function like a TTY. The user can customize the font and display size. **Neck loops** provide a direct connection between a phone or assistive listening device and a hearing aid or cochlear implant.

**Software**, such as screen reader or braille software, can read aloud or convert to braille display information on your computer screen.

**Tactile signalers** use vibration to alert the person to incoming phone calls, smoke alarms, doorbells and other sounds.

**Videophones** allow people who communicate using American Sign Language to make phone calls.
